# INTRODUCTION

Vegan Secret Supper (VSS) grew from humble beginnings in the fall of 2008. In a kitchen half the size of a walk-in closet in a tiny attic apartment in East Vancouver, my raccoon-cat Peewee and I invited anyone who swooned for a plant-based supper. Every Sunday, we served a three-to-five-course meal with an ever-changing vegan menu of seasonal, homemade foods, right down to the sourdough bread. After just one year, VSS was serving up to forty people each Sunday.

As word spread, so did my passion for cooking. Cooking for people is really the best feeling, especially when the room goes quiet as you serve a course. VSS offered our guests a unique and intimate dining experience, serving vegan fare that you couldn't get anywhere else in Vancouver, and filling an alternative niche for diners who wanted something different, and personal.

Since then, VSS and I have traveled eastward, hosting secret suppers in Montreal and Brooklyn.

Let's get the credentials out of the way. I don't have any culinary schooling. I haven't worked much in restaurants. My cred is 100-percent street. For me, cooking is trial, error, and love. I believe that anyone can do anything that they put their mind to. I have had many successful business ventures in my young life so far—fashion designer, gallery and art space curator, ceramicist, to name a few—and vegan chef. And with all of these endeavors, I just do it and figure it out along the way. It's the same for the collection of menus in this book: VSS is an experience, and these recipes reflect that.

Don't be afraid to experiment with the recipes; consider them starting points for your own interpretations. A lot of the menus in this book can be taken apart and put back together in different ways, with aspects (a side, a sauce, a salad) from one menu replacing those from another. As well, know that most of these recipes make enough for six to eight people and can easily be halved for smaller groups.

Many recipes can be made ahead of time. A typical VSS prep is two to three days for a four-course supper, including soaking nuts, making sauces, and refrigerating some desserts overnight. Have patience, and first read the recipes carefully to determine what needs to be made ahead of time. This is slow food at its best.



#### ORGANICS

Organic farming is focused on the sustainability of the environment and emphasizes soil fertility, water conservation, and biodiversity. The techniques of organic farmers predate modern technologies by thousands of years and include the use of animal and green fertilizers and crop rotation. Most people know that synthetic chemical pesticides aren't used in organic farming. Pesticides prevent crop damage and destruction from insects, parasites, and fungi. However, the cost of mass-producing blemish-free crops comes at a high price, as pesticides used in conventional food production are toxic and, at high levels of exposure, potentially carcinogenic. Chemical pesticides used in agricultural practices cannot be effectively removed by rinsing produce. The most effective method for removing pesticides is to peel fruits and vegetables, but this often means also removing the most nutrient-dense part of the food. And because some pesticides contain heavy metals (like arsenic, mercury, and cadmium), the pesticides in food are still harmful to us even when cooked.

The benefits of organic farming are numerous, but one of the most important is that this practice produces amazingly flavorful and nutritionally dense foods. I find that the taste of an organic apple, for example, highly surpasses that of conventional. However, organic foods are more expensive than those conventionally grown. For families on a budget, it can be helpful to know which foods are more important to buy organic if a complete organic grocery bag is not either financially possible or available at the local grocery store.

At VSS, I cook with mainly organic ingredients, but if they aren't available, I buy local. It's important to buy certain foods organic or at least pesticide-free, especially when they are going to be eaten raw. These include foods that tend to absorb more pesticides and usually have more porous skins, such as stone fruits (peaches, nectarines, apricots, plums), berries, and leafy greens. Some crops, like apples and potatoes, conventionally utilize more pesticides. Though these have peelable skins, all the nutrients, like vitamin C, are found in potato skins. It's also important to buy organic nuts, because they can absorb high amounts of toxins.

Another significant consideration is buying locally grown foods. The "locally grown" label denotes a geographic boundary within which the food is grown (e.g., 100 miles). The advantages to buying locally grown produce are numerous and include improved freshness and taste, supporting your local economy, and reducing the environmental impacts of shipping foods across vast distances. Sometimes I face a dilemma: Do I buy the organic but flown-in-from-New-Zealand apple or the non-organic apple produced on a farm forty minutes away? Neither option is absolutely and always correct, but educating yourself on where your food comes from and how it is processed is the first step in making responsible food decisions that affect your health and the environment.

#### ABOUT COOKING VEGETABLES

Cooking makes many foods more digestible, aiding us in utilizing their nutrients and energy, as well as improving their texture and palatability. For example, lightly cooking spinach releases calcium and iron, allowing us to absorb these nutrients. However, over-cooking vegetables destroys heat-sensitive vitamins such as A, B1, C, D, and E. It's best to cook your vegetables for a shorter time at a higher temperature than a longer time at a lower one. Lightly steaming them is often best.

#### FERMENTATION

The human body contains more bacterial cells than we do human cells. It has been suggested that humans and bacterium co-evolved to create a beneficial relationship for both parties: we give bacteria a place to live, and in return they help to break down our food and protect us from the harmful bacteria. Current research examines the links between a lack of good bacteria in the human digestive system and digestive illnesses such as colitis, irritable bowel syndrome, and celiac disease (an autoimmune disease in which the body mounts an immune response to the proteins found in gluten).

Long before we had electricity for refrigerators to keep our foods cold, bacteria were used to preserve foods. Now we depend less on fermented foods than we used to, and sometimes finding foods with active bacterial culture is a challenge. Adding fermented foods like non-dairy yogurts, raw sauerkraut, and miso to a vegan diet is necessary, as they supply some of the few vegan sources of vitamin B12 (also found in nutritional yeast).

#### NUTS

I cook with a lot of nuts. They are a great alternative to soy; filling, flavorful, and full of protein, iron, and good fats. When preparing raw nuts in many recipes, mostly desserts, I first soak them overnight. This makes them easier to blend smoothly, as well as making them more digestible. Nuts are best stored refrigerated, which gives them a longer shelf life. In warm weather, soak nuts in the refrigerator to prevent spoilage.

#### OILS

Choosing a good cooking oil is essential when you decide to get behind the stove and whip up something to eat. The chemical structure of various oils differs, making some better for frying and others better for baking. Polyunsaturated oils (like olive oil) are not recommended for frying because high temperatures break down the molecular structure of the oil and create free radicals. These destructive molecules can lead to cancer. Fortunately, freeradical fighting antioxidants such as alpha-tocopherol or vitamin E, which is found in vegetable oils, combat free radicals in the body.

It's also important to choose oils that are unrefined or at least processed without chemical solvents to ensure the highest nutritional quality as well as flavor. Coldpressed oils are a little more expensive, but they preserve the fatty acids and vitamin content naturally found in the oils. Unrefined oils are filtered, but their natural fragrance, flavor, color and, most important, nutrients are intact. Extra virgin olive oil offers the highest quality flavor and nutritional value, and I use it for baking and in salad dressings.







Fry with oils that can handle high temperatures; these tend to be lower in polyunsaturated fatty acids and higher in saturated fatty acids. I prefer to fry with grapeseed oil, but use other vegetable oils too, including safflower, sunflower, and coconut oil. I often use refined coconut oil for frying, as it has few impurities and can withstand a higher heat. The refined oil has a milder coconut flavor, making it more versatile to cook with. Refined coconut oil is used in most of the desserts in this book.

One last point to consider with oil is that, in addition to being heat sensitive, all oils are light sensitive, so store them in dark containers or keep them away from light in the cupboards to improve their shelf life.

#### FLOURS AND GRAINS

Most of the recipes that use flour in this book specify spelt, with a few exceptions, including sourdough. There are many kinds of spelt flour, but the one called for in this book is white spelt. Spelt is known as an ancient grain because it is an ancestor of common wheat. It's a great option for those who are intolerant of common wheat or wish to eat less of it. A hearty grain with a slightly nutty taste, spelt is high in fiber and acts much like wheat in cooking and baking. Although considered a good wheat-free option, it is not gluten-free and should not be served to those with sensitivities to gluten or celiac disease. Gluten is a protein found in many grains, including wheat, kamut, spelt, rye, and barley. More than half of the recipes in this book are gluten-free, utilizing options such as rice, chickpea, and corn flour. Despite the growing numbers of people with sensitivities or allergies to gluten, it will never be removed from flour because of its crucial role in the chemistry of bread-making. In baking, the gluten in flour binds with water, adding elasticity to the dough. Gluten gives bread a light and chewy texture. For this reason, I use organic whole wheat flour for my sourdough breads and starters to produce higher rising and less dense bread than spelt can provide. The fermentation process that the flour goes through to make sourdough helps to make the wheat more digestible than that in yeasted breads.

### **REFINED FOODS**

The refinement process, whether of oils, flours, or sugars, decreases the nutritional value of foods while creating more homogeneous, "consumer-friendly" products. Refined white flour has been bleached and its health-promoting fibers, vitamins, and minerals removed. Although foods that undergo refinement are usually fortified with (often synthetic) nutrient replacements, they may be lacking the potential health benefits of whole foods, which contain components that haven't been replaced, such as phytochemicals, antioxidants, and trace minerals.

#### SUGARS AND SWEETENERS

I tend to use liquid sweeteners in my recipes—mostly maple syrup, brown rice syrup, and agave nectar. Maple syrup is the sweetest of the three and has a strong flavor. Use organic maple syrup, as conventionally grown may use animal (bone) char in the refinement process. Brown rice syrup, made from fermented brown rice, is thick and mildly sweet with a complex palate. made from fermented brown rice. Agave nectar, made from the agave cactus, is mild in flavor, slightly less expensive than maple syrup, and can be used in its place. Agave nectar is also used in raw cuisine and has a low glycemic index.

Another sweetener I use a lot in baking is Medjool dates, sometimes known as "the king" or "the diamond" of dates. These are large caramel-colored dates, plump, chewy, and very sweet, and not to be confused with California dried cooking dates, available in the baking section of most grocery stores; these are an inferior but acceptable substitute for Medjool dates, in a pinch.

#### MILK ALTERNATIVES

There are many milk alternatives available today; the best known is made from soy. Most of the recipes in this book can be made with any nondairy milk of your choice. When soy milk is specifically called for, the recipe results may be different if you substitute another milk for it.

These recipes also use a lot of coconut milk, especially in the desserts. The higher the quality of the coconut milk, the better the results. Use coconut milk with the highest fat content and avoid light (i.e., low-fat) coconut milks, especially when making desserts where thickening and setting will be affected.

### SOY

When my friends and I were young vegetarians, we got so excited when they started to sell tofu at our local grocery store, and we were absolutely over-the-moon when chocolate soy milk finally came out. However, the novelty of soy has worn off, and it even takes a bit of work to avoid it in most vegetarian/vegan products, as well as in everyday processed foods. Tofu and processed foods made with soy, like faux meats and dairy, can be hard to digest, and because it is found in so many products, there are more people discovering soy allergies. Tofu is also a cliché of vegan cooking, with negative connotations; the over-use of tofu in meatless cooking is precisely why this cookbook does not contain much of it.

A couple of recipes do feature soy products, including tempeh, which is fermented soy; it is more digestible than tofu and its nutrient content can more easily be absorbed. Tamari soy sauce also appears a lot in this book. Tamari is slightly thicker and has a richer taste than regular soy sauce. It tends to be smoother and less salty, too. During fermentation, it requires less wheat than soy sauce. I use a gluten-free tamari.

With a whole foods approach to cooking, you can utilize the texture, nutrition, and flavors of various vegetables, legumes, nuts, and grains available at the average grocery store. There are more creative ways to be vegan than throwing tofu into a frying pan, and it is time that vegan cooking evolved from being "food without meat or dairy" to what it really is or can be: delicious—even decadent—rich, and versatile cuisine, free of animal products and processed ingredients.

# PEPPER CRUSTED CASHEW CHEESE PLATE WITH JUNIPER TOFU පි OLIVE TAPENADE

I serve this with Quick Pickled Beets (p. 199) and Quick Pickled Spicy String Beans (p. 200) along with Sesame Flax Crackers (p. 126), Hazelnut Rye Crisps (p. 123), or Salted Rye Sablés (p. 153).

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

PEPPER CRUSTED CASHEW CHEESE 1 cup (250mL) CashewCheese (p. 192) 1 thsp cracked multi-colored peppercorns tsp red pepper f akes tsp fresh thyme 1/4 tsp salt

Cover a mini-cupcake pan with plastic wrap and spoon Cashew Cheese into cups to form a mold. Cover with more plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1–4 hours, until firm.

In a shallow bowl, combine spices. When ready to serve, remove cheese from cups and roll top and sides in spices.

Makes 6-8 cheese molds, depending on size of cupcake pan.

#### **JUNIPER TOFU**

2 cups (500 mL) water 2 thsp juniper benies, crushed 1 thsp smoked salt <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) brown sugar 1 tsp whole peppercoms 1 tsp dried thyme, or 2 sprigs fresh 3 bay leaves 2 thsp whole corriander 3 whole doves 1 tsp balsamic vinegar 3 thsp red wine

#### 1 1-lb (450 g) pkg medium f mor smoked tofu, drained and cut into ½ in (1 cm) slices grapeseed oil, for fiying 1 tbsp juniper benies 1 tsp ground black pepper 1 tsp smoked salt

In a saucepan on medium-high heat, bring water, 2 tbsp juniper berries, spices and herbs, vinegar, and wine to a boil, and stir until salt and sugar dissolve. Remove from heat, gently add tofu, and submerge. Let marinate at room temperature for 2 hours, or overnight in the refrigerator. Remove tofu from marinade and strain.

In a frying pan on medium-high heat, add enough oil to cover bottom of pan. Heat oil, then add tofu and fry for 4 minutes on each side, until golden brown. Drain on paper towels.

With a mortar and pestle, crush 1 tbsp juniper berries, pepper, and salt. Garnish top of each tofu piece with <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp before serving.

### **OLIVE TAPENADE**

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) chopped green dives with pimentos <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) pitted and chopped kalamata dives 3 piddled garlic cloves or 2 fresh garlic cloves 2 tsp orange juice <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) chopped fresh parsley

In a bowl, combine all ingredients. Makes ¾ cup (185 mL).

### TO PLATE:

assorted pickles and crackers (see suggestions on previous page) heirloom tomatoes

Place Cashew Cheese on each plate. Place about 1 tsp tapenade beside cheese. Arrange 2 slices of tofu on each plate. Serve with assorted crackers, pickles, and heirloom tomatoes.







# BAKED EGGPLANT SAMOSAS WITH ASSORTED CHUTNEYS පි COCONUT SOUR CREAM

Pair these samosas with Brown Rice Risotto with Kidney Beans (p. 95) for a filling meal.

#### • MAKES 8 10 SERVINGS.

<sup>1</sup>/4tspaminseeds 1 thep ref ned coconut ail 1 tsp Garam Masala (p. 210) <sup>1</sup>/2tspground coriander <sup>1</sup>/2tsp.smoked paprika <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tspground turmeric <sup>1</sup>/4tspred pepper fakes 1 large onion, chopped  $1\frac{1}{4}$ tsp salt 4 garlic doves minced 2tbspminced fresh ginger 2 large tomatoes, chopped 1 lb (500g) eggplant, chopped 2tbspwater <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) chopped fresh cilantro 1 batch Coconut Pastry (p. 155)

In a large pot on medium heat, toast cumin seeds for 1 minute, until fragrant. Add coconut oil. When oil has melted, add remainder of spices and cook for another minute, stirring constantly, being careful not to let it scorch. Add onions and salt, and sauté until onions are translucent. Add garlic, ginger, and tomatoes and sauté for another 3 minutes. Add eggplant and water, reduce heat, and simmer for 15–20 minutes, stirring occasion-

ally, until eggplant is soft and tender. Stir in the cilantro and set aside.

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

On a lightly floured surface, roll out half dough recipe to ¼-in (3-mm) thickness with floured rolling pin. Use a 6-in (15-cm) bowl or cookie cutter to cut out circles. Slice each circle in half. Place a heaping tbsp of eggplant mixture onto center of each half circle. Working with straight edge of half circle, fold edges toward each other so that straight edges meet vertically in center. Pinch edges together, then pinch half circle together to form a T-seal. Repeat with remaining filling and dough. On an unoiled baking pan, bake samosas for 12–15 minutes, until golden brown.

Makes 20-25 small samosas.

### TO PLATE:

Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) Assorted chutneys (any or all of, p. 196–97)

Place 1–3 samosas on a plate and spoon 1 tbsp each assorted chutneys around perimeter along with 1 tbsp Coconut Sour Cream.

# CRISPY OYSTER MUSHROOM, SQUASH BLOSSOM & SWEET POTATO TEMPURA WITH GINGER MISO SAUCE & SESAME SWEET RICE

Of all the deep-fried foods, tempura really wins it, because of how light everything still tastes. The oyster mushrooms give an amazing meaty texture not usually found in tempura dishes.

#### • MAKES 6 SERVINGS.

#### **GINGER MISO SAUCE**

1 the grated firesh ginger 1 the pshiromiso 1 the phrown rice syrup 2 tep tahini 1 the pseasoned rice vinegar ½ tep wasabi powder 1 tep tamani 2 tep sesame cil 3 the pwater

In a blender or food processor, combine all ingredients until smooth.

### **SESAME SWEET RICE**

2 cups (500 mL) cooked short grain white or brown rice
2 tbsp toasted sesame seeds
2 tbsp chopped green onions
1 tbsp seasoned rice vinegar
¼ tsp dulse flakes

## CRISPY OYSTER MUSHROOM, SQUASH Blossom ප Sweet Potato tempura

In a bowl, combine all ingredients and set aside.

In a bowl, combine flours, cornstarch, salt, baking soda, and baking powder. In a separate bowl, combine cold water, vinegar, and sesame and grapeseed oils. Gently whisk wet ingredients into dry ingredients. In a separate shallow bowl, add tamari.

In a deep fryer or pot on high, heat 3 in (8 cm) oil to 350°F (180°C). Dip oyster mushrooms into tamari, then coat with tempura batter and drop into hot oil. Fry for 1 minute, turn over, then fry for 1 more minute. Drain on paper towels. Dip squash blossoms and sweet potatoes in tempura batter and fry for about 2 minutes, until slightly golden. Drain on paper towels.

### TO PLATE:

Using a circle mold, place <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) rice in the center of a shallow bowl. Place 1 tempura mushroom, 1 blossom, and a few slices of sweet potato on top of rice. Pour 2 tbsp Ginger Miso sauce into small bowls, 1 for each guest. Serve with chopsticks if desired.

# BRAZIL NUT SEA PÂTÉ WITH APPLES පි SPRING ONIONS

I serve this pâté, reminiscent of tuna, on Sesame Flax Crackers (p. 126) or toasted on Crispy Flatbread Crackers (p. 121) with Coconut Melting Cheese (p. 194) on top.

• MAKES 13/4 CUPS 415 ML.

 1 cup (250 mL) rawBrazil nuts, soaked in 2 cups water for at least 4 hours
 ½ cup (125 mL) rawsunf over seeds, soaked in 1 cup (125 mL) water for at least 4 hours
 2 small garlic doves
 2½-3 tsp lemonjuice, to taste
 2½-3 tsp tamari, to taste
 ½ tsp red pepper f akes
 ¼ tsp kelp powder
 3 spring onions, chopped, both green and white parts
 ½ cup (125 mL) cubed green apples
 1 thsp olive oil or 1 thsp plus 1 tsp vegan mayornaise

Drain soaked nuts and seeds and discard soaking liquid. In a food processor, purée garlic. Add nuts, seeds, lemon juice, tamari, red pepper flakes, dulse, and kelp. Pulse until well-blended but still coarse.

In a bowl, combine onions, apples, puréed mixture, and oil or vegan mayonnaise. With a spoon, stir until combined. Keep refrigerated.

# APPLE SMOKED TOFU & CARAMELIZED ONION Spring Rolls with Carrot Tamarind Chutney & Avocado Aioli

Smoky and sweet flavors are paired here with cool and creamy avocado and spicy carrots.

#### • MAKES ABOUT 15 SPRING ROLLS.

### **AVOCADO AIOLI**

 ½ avocado

 2 thsp firesh cilantro

 1 tsp lime juice

 ½ tsp Dijon mustard

 1 tsp tahini

 ¼ tsp salt

 ¼ tsp ground black pepper

 1 thsp water

 2 thsp olive cil

 ½ jalapeño pepper; seeded and minced

 1 gadic dowe, minced

 1 thsp f nely chopped firesh cilantro

In a blender or food processor, combine avocado, cilantro, lime juice, mustard, tahini, salt, black pepper, and water and blend until smooth. Slowly add oil and blend until emulsified. Stir in jalapeño, garlic, and chopped cilantro.

Makes <sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (160 mL).

### APPLE SMOKED TOFU & CARAMELIZED ONION SPRING ROLLS

2 tsp ref ned coconut or grapeseed oil 1 cup thinly sliced onions, sliced lengthwise 1 tsp tamari

#### 1 tsp balsamic vinegar ½ cup (125 mL) julienned smoked tofu 1 cup (250 mL) julienned Granny Smith apple 15 vegan spring roll vrappers vegetable oil, enough to cover bottom of pot or deep fiyer, at least 2½ in (65 cm) deep

In a frying pan on medium heat, melt oil. Add onions and cook for 3–5 minutes covered, stirring occasionally, until translucent. Add tamari and vinegar and continue to cook with the lid on, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, reducing heat if onions begin to burn. Remove from heat when onions are soft and caramelized.

In a bowl, mix onions, tofu, and apples. Place a spring roll wrapper on a wooden cutting board diagonally, so it forms a diamond shape. Place roughly 2 tbsp onion mixture on bottom corner of wrapper. Roll wrapper straight up and away from you to halfway point, then fold in sides and continue to roll. Dampen edges to seal. Set aside and cover with a damp tea towel. Repeat with remaining filling and wrappers.

In a deep fryer or pot, heat vegetable oil to 375°F (190°C). Add spring rolls, 2 or 3 at a time, being careful not to crowd pot. Fry for about 90 seconds, turn over, and fry for another 90 seconds, until golden. Drain on paper towels.

### **TO PLATE:** Carrot Tamarind Chutney (p. 196)

Cut each spring roll in half on a diagonal. Plate with 1 tbsp each aioli and chutney.



# SEASONAL SQUASH & HEIRLOOM TOMATOES TOSSED WITH PEAR WALNUT BUTTER, SERVED WITH GARLIC CROSTINI & TOASTED SQUASH SEEDS

Pear Walnut Butter is amazing—great on popcorn, sautéed on pasta, or added as a finishing dollop to Butternut Squash & Apple Soup (p. 53).

#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

#### SEASONAL SQUASH 1 small buttercup or butternut squash ½tsp salt 2tsp olive oil

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Cut squash in half lengthwise and seed. Reserve seeds for garnish. Rub each half of squash with salt and olive oil, then wrap in aluminum foil. Bake for 35 minutes, until squash is tender. Set aside until cool enough to handle.

#### TOASTED SQUASH SEEDS squash seeds (pulp and f ber removed) <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp smoked paprika <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp salt

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a small bowl, coat seeds with paprika and salt. Spread evenly on a small baking pan and bake for 5 minutes. Stir and turn seeds and bake for another 3–5 minutes, until they are dry and slightly golden. Set aside.

#### **GARLIC CROSTINI**

3 garlic dows, minced or crushed 2 thsp dive oil 1 tsp balsamic vinegar 12-14 slices day-old French or Sourdough Bread (p. 125) ½ tsp salt

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a bowl, combine garlic, oil, and vinegar. Brush each side of bread with oil mixture and place on a baking sheet. Sprinkle with salt. Bake for 8 minutes, then turn over and bake for another 8 minutes.

### PEAR WALNUT BUTTER

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>pear <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>bulb garlic 1 thsp olive oil <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) to asted walnuts 1 thsp nutritional yeast 1 thsp + 1 tsp lemon juice 1 thsp chopped firesh sage <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp Dijon must and <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp salt

#### <sup>1</sup>/4tsp ground black pepper 3tbsp olive oil

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Wrap pear half in aluminum foil. Slice top off garlic bulb to expose the cloves. Make a packet with aluminum foil for garlic and olive oil. Bake pear and garlic for 25 minutes, or until pear is cooked through and garlic is soft.

Let pear cool, then core and peel it. Once garlic has cooled, squeeze cloves out of skins. In a blender or food processor, combine pear and garlic with remainder of ingredients except 3 tbsp oil and blend until smooth. Slowly add oil and blend until emulsified.

Makes 1 cup (250 mL).

# TO FINISH AND PLATE:

1/4 cup (60 mL) Pear Walnut Butter 4 heirloom tomatoes, sliced into wedges coarse salt, for garnish

Peel skin from cooked squash and cut into cubes. On medium-high, heat a frying pan. Add Pear Walnut Butter, tomatoes, and squash and sauté for 3 minutes, until warmed. Divide among 6 plates. Place 2 crostini on each plate. Sprinkle with squash seeds and coarse salt.

# PORCINI PECAN NORI ROLLS With Ginger Pear Paper ど Miso Tahini Sauce

This dish can be made without the Pear Paper if you don't have a dehydrator; instead, add julienned pears to the rolls. The Porcini pâté is also great on toasted Sourdough Bread (p. 125).

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

## PORCINI PECAN PÂTÉ

½cup (125 mL) dried parcini mushrooms soaked in 1 cup (250 mL) hot water for 20 minutes (reserve soaking liquid)
1 tsp grapeseed oil
1 mediumonion, chopped
2 garlic doves, chopped
½ tsp Dijonmustard
2 tsp tamari
1 tsp lemonjuice
1 tsp sæsoned nice vinegar
1 tsp Sriracha (hot T ai chili sauce)
1 cup (250 mL) toasted pecans
2 tsp tahini

While mushrooms are soaking, in a frying pan, heat oil and sauté onions until translucent. Add garlic, mustard, tamari, lemon juice, vinegar, and Sriracha. Drain mushrooms and reserve liquid. Add mushrooms and ½ cup (125 mL) soaking liquid to pan and sauté for 3 minutes. Remove from heat.

In a food processor, blend pecans and tahini with cooked mixture to form a smooth pâté. Add extra soaking liquid if needed.

## **GINGER PEAR PAPER**

6 nipe pears 2 tsp lemon juice 3 tbsp grated firesh ginger 2 tbsp toæsted sesame sæds

Chop pears and remove cores. In a blender or food processor, blend pears with lemon juice and ginger. Stir in sesame seeds.

On Silpat (non-stick) dehydrator trays, spread layer of pear purée in a  $\frac{1}{4}$ -in (6-mm) thick rectangle, the size of a sheet of nori. Dehydrate at 115°F (46°C) for 40 minutes, or until pear "paper" is dry enough to peel off tray, but not brittle.

Makes 6-8 sheets of paper.

## **MISO TAHINI SAUCE**


2tbsp tahini 2tbsp lemonjuice 2garlic doves 1 tsp tamari ½tsp Dijonmustard ½tsp grated fresh ginger ¼tsp cayenne pepper ¼cup (60 mL) water 1 tbsp shiromiso ½cup (125 mL) divecil

In a food processor or blender, purée all ingredients until smooth.

## TO ASSEMBLE AND PLATE:

1 cup (250 mL) julienned carrots 2 avocados, sliced 1 cup (250 mL) sunflower sprouts 6–8 sheets nori

On a cutting board or wood counter, roll out a sushi mat. (If you don't have one, you can do this without.) Lay a sheet of pear paper on the mat, then a sheet of nori. Spoon 3 tbsp pecan pâté in a rectangle on bottom quarter of nori. Arrange a few carrots, slices of avocado, julienned pears if omitting pear paper, and sprouts on top of pâté. Tightly roll up nori sheet, away from you, using bamboo mat as an aid. Repeat with each sheet. Cut each roll into 6 slices and arrange on a plate. Top with 1 tbsp of Miso Tahini Sauce.



# **RAW CORN CHIPS WITH AVOCADO PICO**

Sweet corn flavor with a classic pico, a Mexican condiment made with finely chopped raw vegetables, including tomatoes, tomatillos, peppers, and avocado.

#### • MAKES 2 CUPS 250ML.

#### **RAW CORN CHIPS**

2 cups (500 mL) rawcom, about 3 cobs cup (80 mL) ground golden f ax seeds 1 thsp chopped shallots 1 garlic dove 1 thsp limejuice ½ tsp salt

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients. Let sit for 4 hours.

On Silpat (non-stick) dehydrator trays, spread mixture  $\frac{1}{8}$ -in (3-mm) thick. Sprinkle with extra salt, to taste, and dehydrate at 115°F (46°C) for 13 hours, until crispy and dry.

After about 6 hours, when mixture is still soft but dry enough to peel off tray, use sharp kitchen shears to cut into triangles. Continue to dehydrate for another 7 hours. Break apart and store in a sealed container.

Makes about 20 chips.

## AVOCADO PICO

1 large avocado, cut into small cubes 1 cup (250 mL) tomato, diced ½ jalapeño pepper, seeded and diced 2 tsp shallots, f nely diced 1 small gardic dove, f nely diced 2½ tsp lime juice 2 tbsp f nely chopped fresh cilantro salt, to taste

In a bowl, combine all ingredients.

## TO PLATE:

Serve pico in a small bowl with a bowl of your homemade chips beside it.

# **CONDENSED SIMPLE STOCK**

I like to put a lot of my vegetable ends (from chopped onions, remains of roasted garlic bulbs, carrots, leeks, or celery) and mushroom and parsley stems into a large freezer bag—my "stock bag"—and store it in the freezer. Once the bag is full, I'm ready to make stock. This stock is reduced so it won't take up too much room; freeze it in ice-cube trays, then store in a freezer bag. When making soup from it, add water to the concentrated stock (¼ cup for each cube of stock).

#### • MAKES ROUGHLY6CUPS 1.5L STOCK.

1 1-gal (4L) stock bag 2tbsp dive al 1/4 cup (60 mL) dry white wine, or 2 tbsp white wine vinegar 2 sprigs fresh thyme 2 sprigs fresh rosemary 1/2 tsp coriander seeds 3 bay leaves 3 tsp salt 1 tbsp whole peppercorns 12 cups (3L) water

Remove full stock bag from freezer. In a large soup pot on medium-high, heat olive oil, then add contents of the stock bag (no need to defrost). Sauté until vegetables soften, about 5–10 minutes. Add wine or vinegar and cook for another 5 minutes. Add herbs, salt, peppercorns, and water and bring to a boil.

Once it boils, reduce heat and simmer for 2 hours, until stock has reduced by half. Remove from heat. Let stock cool completely, even overnight if desired, before straining out vegetables, herbs, and peppercorns with a fine mesh strainer. If not using right away, freeze in ice cube trays, then store frozen cubes in a freezer bag.

# **MUSHROOM CONSOMMÉ**

When I cook with mushrooms, I save the stalks in my "stock bag" (p. 45) in the freezer. This is great as a clear soup or stock for risotto.

• MAKES 8 CUPS 2L.

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In a large soup pot on medium-high, heat oil, then sauté onions and salt until onions are translucent. Add garlic, mushroom stalks, sage, and rosemary and cook for 3 minutes. Add wine, tamari, and peppercorns and cook for 5 minutes. Add water and bring to a boil. Once it boils, reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 30 minutes. Remove from heat.

When stock has cooled, strain and discard vegetables, herbs, and spices.

# SPICED PEANUT & YAM SOUP WITH PICKLED STRING BEANS & SWEET COCONUT BREAD

Simple and filling, this spiced and creamy soup pairs perfectly with warm Sweet Coconut Bread, a favorite menu item at VSS.

#### MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

## **SPICED PEANUT & YAM SOUP**

2thsp cocnut oil 1 tsp ground curian 1 tsp ground cirriamon 1½ tsp ground coriander ½ tsp red pepper fakes 1 large onion, chopped 5 gadic dows, smashed 2 thsp grated or finely diced fresh ginger 4 cups (1 L) cubed and peeled yams cup (80 mL) smooth natural pearut butter (I use Valencia, but any will work) 1 cup (250 mL) cocnut milk 6 cups (1.5 L) stock (p 45) or water salt and ground black pepper; to taste juice of 1 lime, to finish

In a large soup pot on medium-high heat, melt coconut oil. Add spices and red pepper flakes and cook until fragrant, just under 1 minute. Add onions and sauté until translucent. Add garlic and ginger and sauté for another 2 minutes. Add yams and continue cooking. Add a splash of stock if necessary to keep from scorching.

While yams cook, in a bowl, whisk peanut butter with coconut milk until smooth. Add to yams and follow with remainder of stock. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat, and simmer for 15 minutes, until yams are soft. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

In a blender or with an immersion blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids. Add lime juice just before serving.

## TO PLATE:

Sweet Coconut Bread (p. 126) Quick Pickled Spicy String Beans (p. 200)

Ladle a serving of soup into a bowl. Add a garnish of coconut milk and a pickled string bean sliced in half lengthwise. Serve with a wedge of warm Sweet Coconut Bread.

# SPLIT PEA BISQUE WITH MINTED COCONUT CREAM & CUMIN CROUTONS

Split peas, or dried field peas, require no soaking before cooking, which means it's relatively quick to prepare a filling soup like this one. Cumin and mint add an exotic layering of flavors to the hearty soup.

#### MAKES 10 12 SERVINGS.

## **SPLIT PEA BISQUE**

1 the grapesed oil 1 mediumonion, chopped 1 roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed (reserve oil) 1 tep smoked or regular salt 1 tep ground black pepper 1 tep fresh thyme <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) dry white wine 2 cups green split peas ninsed 6 cups (1.5 L) stock (p. 45) 1 bay leaf 2 tep white wine vinegar

In a large soup pot on medium-high, heat oil, then sauté onions until translucent. Add roasted garlic cloves, salt, pepper, and thyme. Add wine and sauté for about 2 minutes, until wine has reduced. Add split peas, stock, bay leaf, and white wine vinegar. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to a simmer. Cook for 20 minutes, or until peas are tender. Discard bay leaf.

In a blender or with an immersion blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

## MINTED COCONUT CREAM

### <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) coconut milk 3 tbsp chopped fresh mint

In a blender, purée coconut milk and mint until smooth.

#### CUMIN CROUTONS

2 cups (500 mL) cubed day-old bread 2 tsp cil, a mix of reasted garlic cil and dive cil 1 tsp whole cumin sæds ½ tsp salt

#### Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a bowl, toss bread cubes with oil, cumin seeds, and salt. Spread on an unoiled cookie sheet and bake for 5 minutes, turn over and bake for another 5 minutes, until golden brown.

## TO PLATE:

Ladle a serving of bisque into a bowl. Garnish with 1 tbsp of Minted Coconut Cream and a few croutons.

# BLACK BEAN SOUP WITH COCONUT SOUR CREAM & PINE NUT PARMESAN

I recommend that you cook from dried beans, but if you don't have the time, you can use canned beans with added salt (rinse them well before using).

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

### **BLACK BEAN SOUP**

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp cumin seeds 2 tsp grapeseed oil 1 large Spanish onion, chopped 1 tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp ground chili powder <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp ground chipotle pepper 1 cup (250 mL) peeled and chopped potato 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups (375 mL) cooked black beans 4 cups (1 L) stock (p. 45) or water 1 tsp lime juice

In a large soup pot on medium-high heat, toast cumin seeds until fragrant. Add oil and onions and sauté until onions are translucent. Add salt, chili, and chipotle, and cook for another minute before adding potatoes and black beans. Add stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes. Add lime juice and, using an immersion blender or blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

Makes 6 cups (1.5 L).

## **TO PLATE:**

Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) Pine Nut Parmesan (p. 193)

Ladle soup into a shallow bowl. Sprinkle with 2 tsp of crumbled Pine Nut Parmesan and drizzle with 2 tsp of Coconut Sour Cream.

# CARAMELIZED ONION BISQUE WITH ROASTED GARLIC TOAST

A deconstructed French onion soup, served with cheesy sourdough toast.

#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

### FRENCH ONION BISQUE

2tbsp oliveoil 2large yellowonions, halved and sliced thinly, lengthwise 3/4tsp salt, to taste 2tsp balsamic vinegar 1/4 cup (60 mL) dry white wine 1/4 tsp Dijon mistard 1/2 tsp tomato paste 1/2 tsp ground black pepper 1/4 tsp red pepper f akes 1/2 tsp fresh thyme 1 bay leaf 1/2 roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed and minced 5 cups (1.25 L) stock (p. 45)

In a large soup pot on medium-low, heat oil then sauté onions and salt for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add vinegar and continue to cook for another 10 minutes until onions are soft and golden.

Increase heat to medium and add  $\frac{1}{3}$  of wine. Sauté for 2 minutes and repeat with another  $\frac{1}{3}$  of wine. Repeat until wine is gone.

Add mustard, tomato paste, pepper, red pepper flakes, thyme, and bay leaf. Add garlic and stir for 1–2 minutes. Add stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes.

Discard bay leaf. With an immersion blender or in

a blender, purée half the soup until smooth (optional). Be careful when blending hot liquids. Return to pot and gently reheat.

## **ROASTED GARLIC TOAST**

## 10 slices Sourdough (p. 125) or French bread Coconut Melting Cheese (p. 194)

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

On an unoiled baking sheet, place slices of bread. Spread generously with Coconut Melting Cheese and bake for 10 minutes, or until bread is golden brown and cheese is bubbly. If necessary, heat oven to broil to get the cheese bubbly, if you find the bread is toasting too quickly. Broil for 2–4 minutes, checking frequently to make sure it doesn't burn.

## TO PLATE:

Serve in classic onion soup bowls topped with 1 or 2 slices of toast.





# BUTTERNUT SQUASH & APPLE SOUP WITH CHIPOTLE APPLE REDUCTION, COCONUT SOUR CREAM & ROASTED SQUASH SEEDS

Even in squash season, I can never get my hands on enough squash. This soup is one of my classic VSS recipes, smooth and creamy with a hint of spice and sweetness.

#### MAKES 10 12 SERVINGS.

## **BUTTERNUT SQUASH & APPLE SOUP**

1 mediumbuttemut squash 2 the grapeseed oil <sup>1</sup>/4tspgarammasala (p. 210) 1 tsp.smoked paprika <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground cinnamon 1 thep brown sugar (optional) <sup>1</sup>/2tspeach salt and pepper 1 whole garlic bulb 3tbsp dive ail 1 mediumanian, chapped 2tsp.salt 1 the grapesed oil 1 white f eshed sweet potato, peeled and chopped 1 apple peeled and chopped 1 tsp apple cider vinegar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp caverne pepper <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp ground black pepper 8 cups (2L) water or stock (p. 45)

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

With a large knife, remove stalk from squash. Cut squash in half lengthwise. With a spoon, scoop out seeds and set aside.

On a baking pan or dish with at least <sup>1</sup>/2-in (1-cm) lip, place squash face up. Drizzle oil evenly on both halves.

Sprinkle garam masala, smoked paprika, cinnamon, brown sugar (if using), and salt and pepper on squash halves. Fill pan with enough water to cover bottom with about  $\frac{1}{4}-\frac{1}{2}$  in ( $\frac{1}{2}-1$  cm) water. Bake for 20 minutes. Carefully turn squash halves so they are resting face down in water, then bake for another 20 minutes, until soft. Set aside to cool a little.

Cut tops off garlic bulb to expose cloves. Place in aluminum foil and fold foil to form a small bowl. Pour in 3 tbsp olive oil and fold foil to create a sealed packet. Set in a small oven-proof bowl and bake with squash for 25 minutes, or until garlic is soft and fragrant. Set aside.

Meanwhile, in a large soup pot on medium-high, heat grapeseed oil, then sauté onions and salt until onions are translucent. Add sweet potato, apple, cider vinegar, cayenne, and black pepper and cook for another 3 minutes. Add the water or stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer. When squash is cool enough to handle, remove skin with a knife and discard. Roughly chop squash. Add squash and water from pan to soup. Add roasted garlic and oil to soup. Simmer for about 10 minutes, until sweet potato is soft. In a blender or with an immersion blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

## **ROASTED SQUASH SEEDS**

### squash seeds reserved from squash (f ber and pulp removed) ¼ tsp salt ¼ tsp smoked paprika

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C). In a small bowl, coat seeds with salt and paprika. Spread seeds evenly on a small baking pan and bake for 5 minutes. Stir and turn seeds and bake for another 3–5 minutes, until dry and slightly golden.

## TO PLATE:

Chipotle Apple Reduction (p. 205) Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195)

Ladle a serving of soup into a bowl. Drizzle with 1 tsp of Chipotle Apple Reduction and a spoonful of Coconut Sour Cream. Top with a few of the roasted squash seeds.

# FENNEL PORTOBELLO SOUP WITH SMOKE-INFUSED OLIVE OIL

This savory soup has been known to seduce even the most stubborn mushroom skeptic.

#### • MAKES 10 12 SERVINGS.

### FENNEL PORTOBELLO SOUP

1 roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed 2 tsp grapeseed oil 1 large onion, chopped 1 fennel bulb, chopped 1 tsp salt 8 portobello mishroom caps, chopped 1 tsp fresh sage 1 tsp fresh rosemary ½ tsp ground black pepper ½ tsp red pepper f akes 2 tsp tamari 1 tsp white wine vinegar ½ cup (125 mL) champagne or dry white wine 8 cups (2 L) stock (p. 45) or water


While garlic is roasting, in a large soup pot on mediumhigh, heat oil, then sauté onions, fennel, and salt until onions are translucent. Add portobellos, sage, and rosemary and cook until soft. Add pepper, red pepper flakes, tamari, and vinegar. Add wine and cook for 2 minutes before adding stock or water. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes. Add roasted garlic cloves.

In a blender or with an immersion blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

## TO PLATE:

Smoked-Infused Olive Oil (p. 206) smoked salt, for garnish

Ladle a serving of soup into a bowl and drizzle with ½ tsp of Smoke-Infused Olive Oil. Finish with a little sprinkle of smoked salt.



# BEET පි CABBAGE SOUP WITH COCONUT SOUR CREAM පි ROSEMARY OIL

Not your grandmother's borscht. This soup pairs amazingly with Hazelnut Rye Crisps (p. 123).

#### • MAKES 4 6SERVINGS.

### **BEET & CABBAGE SOUP**

2tspgrapeseed oil 1 mediumonion diced 4 gardic doves minced <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp whole contander seeds, crushed <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp firesh chopped rosemary <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground black pepper 1 tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp caverne pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp tomato paste 21/2 cups (625 mL) peeled and cubed beets 1½ cups (375 mL) red cabbage, shredded 2 tbsp red wine (or use red wine vinegar and omit apple cider vinegar) 1 tsp balsamic vinegar 1 bay leaf 5 cups (1.25L) stock (p. 45) 1 tsp apple cider vinegar salt, to taste (optional)

In a pot on medium, heat oil, then sauté onions until translucent. Add garlic, coriander, rosemary, pepper, salt, cayenne, and tomato paste. Add beets and cabbage, stirring constantly. Add wine and reduce for 2 minutes. Add balsamic vinegar. Add bay leaf and stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes, until beets are tender. Add cider vinegar and season with salt, if needed. Discard bay leaf.

In a food processor or blender, purée 1 cup of soup, then return to the pot (optional). Be careful when blending hot liquids.

## TO PLATE:

Rosemary Olive Oil (p. 206) Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) or Cashew Cheese (p. 192)

Ladle a serving of soup into a bowl. Drizzle with ½ tsp Rosemary Oil and 1 tsp Sour Cream or Cashew Cheese.

# SHIITAKE DASHI WITH SNOW PEAS & OYSTER MUSHROOM 양 TEMPEH WONTONS

Traditional dashi is a clear soup stock in Japanese cooking, usually made with bonito flakes (from tuna). This version uses dried shiitakes, which you can find in Asian markets, and kombu, a type of seaweed. Do not wash the kombu, as it comes with a white residue on it, which is a big part of its flavor. Dashi is also a great base for miso soup.

#### • MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

## **OYSTER MUSHROOM & TEMPEH WONTONS**

8oz (230g) tempeh, cubed
1 recipe Ginger Miso Sauce (p. 28)
1 tsp grapeseed oil
½ lb (125g) oyster mushrooms, stalks removed and reserved for dashi, below
½ tsp red pepper f akes
1½ tsp tamari
1 tsp seasoned nice vinegar
2 thsp chopped cilantro
3 thsp chopped green onion
13 oz (370g) pkg square or round vegan wonton virappers

In a bowl, combine tempeh and Ginger Miso Sauce and marinate for 4 hours or overnight in refrigerator.

In a frying pan on medium-high, heat oil then add tempeh, reserving marinade. Fry for 5 minutes, then turn over to brown evenly. Add oyster mushrooms and continue cooking until soft. Reduce heat to medium and add red pepper flakes, tamari, stock, vinegar, and reserved marinade. Cook for another 5 minutes.

In a food processor, add tempeh mixture, cilantro, and

green onions. Pulse until evenly ground.

On a clean work surface like a cutting board, lay out a few wonton wrappers. Keep a small bowl of water near you. Place 1 tsp of mushroom and tempeh filling in middle of each wrapper. With your finger or a small brush, dampen perimeter of wrapper. Fold in half, pressing edges closed and pushing out any air bubbles. Place on a parchment-lined cookie sheet and cover with damp tea towel or paper towel. Repeat until filling is used up.

At this point, you can freeze wontons on the cookie sheet, transferring to freezer bag or container once frozen, or you can use right away. They will keep, covered in refrigerator, for 1 day.

Makes 50 wontons.

Bring a large pot of salted water to boil on high heat. Drop in wontons and return to a boil. Boil for 3 minutes (5 minutes if frozen), until they float to the surface. Strain.



### SHIITAKE DASHI

4 dried shiitake mishrooms 1 6 in (15 cm) piece dried kombu ½ cup (125 mL) oyster mishroomstalks (reserved fromwontons) 6 cups (1.5 L) water 2 thsp tamari 1 thsp seasoned nice vinegar 1½ cups (375 mL) snowpæs, trimmed

Soak shiitakes, kombu, and oyster mushroom stalks in water for 4 hours. Use a plate or inverted pot lid to keep mushrooms submerged. Discard kombu. In a soup pot on medium-high heat, bring water and mushrooms to a boil. Once boiling, remove shiitakes. Add tamari and rice vinegar and simmer for 3 minutes. Discard oyster mushrooms and add snow peas. Simmer for 2 minutes before serving.

# TO PLATE:

sesame oil, to finish micro wasabi sprouts, about 1 tsp per serving, for garnish

Place 4 wontons in each bowl. Ladle a serving of dashi into each bowl along with 5 snow peas. Drizzle with  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp sesame oil and top with wasabi sprouts.

## ON MAKING MISO SOUP

Miso should not be boiled, at high tem peratures, it loses nutritional value To make miso soup, stir a small amount of hot water into a bowl with desired amount of miso paste, then add this to the soup at the end of the cooking process, slowly raise the temperature, but do not let the soup boil after adding miso





# CARROT GINGER SOUP WITH LEMON BASIL CREAM

A spicy soup with a hint of Thai flavor.

#### • MAKES 10 12 SERVINGS.

### CARROT GINGER SOUP

1 tspref ned coconut or grapeseed oil <sup>1</sup>/2tsp whole contander seeds tsp fernel seeds <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp red pepper f akes 1 largeonion, chopped 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-2tsp salt, to taste 4 gardic doves aushed 1 tbsp grated or minced ginger 1 lemongræssstalk 5 cups (1.25L) chopped carrots 1 cup (250 mL) peeled and chopped yams 1 bay leaf 8cups(2L) stock (p. 45) 2tspægavenedar 1 tsplimejuice salt. to taste

In a soup pot on medium-high heat, melt coconut oil. Add coriander, fennel, and red pepper flakes and fry for 1 minute before adding onions and salt. Sauté until translucent. Add garlic, ginger, lemongrass, carrots, and yams and continue to sauté for 3 minutes. Add bay leaf and stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Add agave nectar and lime juice. Season with salt if needed. Remove from heat and discard lemongrass stalks and bay leaf. In a blender, or with an immersion blender, purée soup until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

Makes 12 cups (3 L).

### LEMON BASIL CREAM

1/4 cup (60 mL) coconut milk or Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) 1/4 cup (60 mL) loosely packed fresh lemon basil (or regular) leaves

In a blender, blend coconut milk and basil. Strain with a fine mesh strainer.

## TO PLATE:

Portion soup into shallow bowls and drizzle 1 tsp Basil Cream over soup.



# WATERMELON RED PEPPER GAZPACHO

A surprising and colorfully refreshing chilled summer soup. It's great with yellow peppers and yellow watermelons, too!

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

### 1 red bell pepper; roughly chopped 2 tsp limejuice ½ red jalapeño, seeded and chopped 8 cups (2 L) cubed watermelon

In a blender, purée all ingredients. Chill thoroughly.

FOR GARNISH: ground black pepper about ½ cup (125 mL) micro basil sprouts about ½ cup (125 mL) micro cilantro sprouts

# TO PLATE:

Ladle a serving of soup into a bowl. Garnish with ground pepper and 1 tsp each fresh basil and cilantro sprouts.

# SESAME AVOCADO QUINOA PILAF WITH FRIED SWEET PLANTAIN, CARAMELIZED RAMPS & MINTED COCONUT CREAM

Ramps, also referred to as wild leeks, have a short growing season in early spring, and are mostly prevalent on the East Coast. A mix between onions and garlic in flavor, ramps are mild enough to eat raw, and you can use the leaves as well as the stem.

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

#### CARAMELIZED RAMPS

2tsp coconut oil 1 small bunch firesh ramps, greens trimmed of and set aside, and sliced in half salt, to taste

In a frying pan on medium heat, melt coconut oil. Add ramps cut-side down and sprinkle with salt. When ramps have turned slightly golden, stir and reduce heat. Cover and cook until translucent and caramelized. Set aside.

### SESAME AVOCADO QUINOA PILAF

1 cup (250 mL) uncocked quinca 2 cups (500 mL) water ½ tsp salt greens from the ramps (above), chopped 1 avocado, cubed ¼ cup (60 mL) chopped cilantro

In a saucepan on medium-high heat, toast quinoa for about 1 minute, stirring constantly before adding water and salt. Bring to a boil and cook, stirring occasionally for 10 minutes, until water level is just beneath quinoa. Cover and reduce heat to low, and continue to cook for 10 minutes. Remove from heat. On an unoiled baking sheet, spread quinoa to let cool evenly.

In a large bowl, combine greens, avocado, and cilantro and add cooked quinoa. Add dressing (below) and stir until combined.


### DRESSING FOR PILAF

1/2 cup Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) 2 tsp sesame oil 3 thsp olive oil salt and pepper; to taste

In a bowl, whisk Coconut Sour Cream with sesame and olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Set aside.

## MINTED COCONUT CREAM ¼cup (60mL) coconut milk 3tbsp chopped fresh mint

In a blender, purée coconut milk and mint until smooth. Set aside.



## **FRIED SWEET PLANTAIN**

2tbsp coconut oil 1 sweet plantain, sliced into ¼ in (6 nm) thick rounds juice of 1 lime salt, to taste

In a flat-bottomed frying pan on medium-high heat, melt coconut oil. Add plantain and fry both sides until golden brown. Sprinkle each side with salt and squeeze lime juice over plantains just before removing from pan. Drain excess oil from plantains on paper towel if you wish.


## TO PLATE:

1 lime, cut into 6-8 wedges, for garnish

Place <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) pilaf in center of a plate. Top with 3 slices plantain and a couple caramelized ramps. Dot plate with Minted Coconut Cream and garnish with lime wedge.

# APPLE BEET SALAD WITH LEMON TAMARI VINAIGRETTE, BAKED HAZELNUT CHEESE & SESAME MUSTARD

Beets and apples are one of my favorite combinations, especially when served raw as in this bright and colorful salad.



#### • MAKES 5 SERVINGS.

## APPLE BEET SALAD WITH LEMON TAMARI VINAIGRETTE

1 garlic dove, f nely diced or crushed 1 tsp f nely diced shallot 1 tsp f nely diced shallot 1 tsp lemon juice 2 tsp tamari 1 tsp maplesyrup 2 tsp chopped firesh rosemary 1 tsp chopped firesh sage ½ tsp red pepper f akes (optional) ¼ cup (60 mL) dive oil 2 medium beets, grated or julierned 2 green apples, grated or julierned

In a food processor or blender, blend all ingredients except beets and apples, until emulsified.

In a bowl, toss apples and beets together with vinaigrette. Marinate for at least 30 minutes in refrigerator.

### BAKED HAZELNUT CHEESE

1 cup (250 mL) hazelnuts, soaked in 1 thsp miso and 2 cups (500 mL) water overnight (reserve liquid) 2 thsp lemon juice 1 thsp tahini 1 thsp nutritional yeast 1 tsp salt 1 gardic dove

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

Drain hazelnuts, reserving soaking liquid. In a food processor or blender, purée hazelnuts with remainder of ingredients. Add reserved soaking liquid if mix is too dry. Blend until it just comes together, like an extremely wet dough.

On a lightly oiled baking sheet, crumble or drop the cheese in small chunks and bake for 10 minutes, until firm to the touch and slightly golden.

Makes 1 cup.

## SESAME MUSTARD

2tbsp tahini 2tbsp lemon juice 2garlic doves 2tsp tamari <sup>1</sup>/4tsp cayenne pepper 2tsp Dijon mustard 2tsp maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/2tsp grated fiesh ginger (optional) cup (80 mL) oliveoil 2tbsp water

In a food processor or blender, purée all ingredients until smooth.

Makes 1/2 cup.

## TO PLATE:

about 3-4 cups mixed greens, enough for 5 people

Place a small amount of mixed greens on a plate. Top with about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) apples and beets. Spoon Sesame Mustard around perimeter of plate and sprinkle Hazelnut Cheese over apples and beets.

## LIGHTLY BATTERED SMOKE-BLANCHED CAULIFLOWER WITH RED QUINOA TABOULI & TAHINI DRESSING

The cauliflower in this dish is so delicately battered that it stays light. It has a gentle, smoky palate.

#### • MAKES 6 SERVINGS.

## LIGHTLY BATTERED SMOKE-BLANCHED CAULIFLOWER

10chenywood or hickory chips 1 qt/L water 2 tsp salt ½ head of caulif over; separated into forets ¼ cup (60 mL) rice four ¼ cup (60 mL) com four ¾ cup (185 mL) milk (nut, rice, etc.) 1 tsp lemon juice 1 tsp salt vegetable oil, enough to fll a pot 2 in (5 cm) deep

Using a lighter, carefully smolder the smoke chips slightly. Add them to a large pot with water and salt on high heat. Place cauliflower in a strainer that fits pot. Dip strainer into boiling water and cook for 4 minutes. Fill a large bowl with cold tap water and ice cubes (you may wish to do this in the kitchen sink) and submerge cauliflower to stop the cooking process. Strain and set aside.

In a bowl, whisk together rice and corn flour, milk, lemon juice, and salt. In a pot on medium or in a deep fryer set to 350°F (180°C), heat oil. Dip cauliflower into batter then fry for 90 seconds, turn, then fry for another 90 seconds, until golden. Drain on paper towels. Serve hot.

### **RED QUINOA TABOULI**

1 cup (250mL) red quinca 2 cups (500mL) water ½ tsp salt cup (80mL) chopped freshmint 1 cup (250mL) chopped fresh parsley cup (80mL) f nely chopped shallots 1 cup (250mL) halved cherry tomatoes 1 avocado, chopped ¼ cup (60mL) lemonjuice ¼ cup (60mL) lemonjuice ¼ cup (60mL) divecil 1 tsp salt 1 tsp ground black pepper ¼ tsp red pepper f akes

In a saucepan on medium-high heat, toast quinoa for about 1 minute, stirring constantly before adding water and salt. Bring to a boil and cook, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, until water level is just beneath quinoa. Cover and reduce heat to low and continue to cook for 10 minutes. Remove from heat. On an unoiled baking sheet, spread quinoa to let cool evenly.

In a bowl, combine cooked, cooled quinoa, mint, parsley, shallots, cherry tomatoes, and avocado. Set aside.



In another bowl, whisk lemon juice, oil, salt, pepper, and red pepper flakes until emulsified. Add this to quinoa mixture to coat. Stir gently and set aside.

### **TAHINI DRESSING**

1 thsp tahini 1 thsp lemonjuice ½ roasted garlic bulb, skins removed (p. 189) 2 tsp tamari ½ tsp Dijon mustard ¼ tsp cayenne pepper 2 thsp water ¼ cup (60 mL) divecil In a blender or food processor, combine all ingredients except oil and blend until smooth. Slowly add the oil and blend until emulsified.

Makes ½ cup (125 mL).

## **TO PLATE:**

Using a 3-in (8-cm) round mold, spoon <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) tabouli into center of a plate. Slice cauliflower florets in half. Place 1–2 floret halves on top of quinoa. Drizzle 1 tbsp of tahini dressing around edges of plate.

# WINTER GREENS WITH MISO SESAME SHIITAKES, RADISH, GOMASHIO ଙ GRAINY MUSTARD EMULSION

There are many greens that grow year-round, making fresh salad not just for warm weather. This salad pairs perfectly with Shiitake Dashi (p. 60).

#### • MAKES 6 SERVINGS.

Winter Greens 6cups (1.5L) washed and trimmed winter greens (frisée, romaine, butterhead) ½ bunch green onions, chopped 1 bunch radishes, trimmed and sliced

In a large bowl, toss greens with just enough Grainy Mustard Emulsion (below) to lightly coat. Add green onions and radishes.

#### **GRAINY MUSTARD EMULSION**

1 gadic dove, mined 2 tsp grainy mustard 1 tbsp lemonjuice 1 tbsp seasoned nice vinegar 1 tsp white wine vinegar ½ tsp salt ½ tsp ground black pepper 1 tbsp water ¼ cup (60 mL) dive cil

In a bowl, whisk together all ingredients except oil. Slowly add oil while whisking to emulsify.

## TO ASSEMBLE AND PLATE:

Miso Sesame Shiitake Mushrooms (p. 190) Gomashio (p. 211)

Place 1 cup (250 mL) greens on a plate. Top with shiitakes and sprinkle with gomashio. Spoon 2 tsp Grainy Mustard Emulsion around perimeter of plate.



## MUSTARD ROASTED NUGGET POTATOES WITH CRISPY FENNEL පි SMOKY PORTOBELLOS

Fingerling potatoes also work nicely with this recipe, which can be served hot or at room temperature. Try to choose the smallest potatoes for roasting.

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

### **MUSTARD VINAIGRETTE**

2 garlic doves 2 thsp Dijon mistard ½ tsp Barbados style habañero hot sauce 2 thsp lemonjuice 1 thsp brown sugar or agavenedar ¼ tsp tomato paste 1 tsp fresh thyme ½ tsp fresh tanagon ½ tsp salt ¾ cup (185 mL) divecil

In a blender or food processor, purée all ingredients except oil. While blender is running, slowly add oil and blend until smooth.

## **ROASTED NUGGET POTATOES**

#### 2lb (1 kg) nugget potatoes, washed and out in half cup (80mL) Mustard Vinaigrette

Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).

In a bowl, toss potatoes with vinaigrette. Place potatoes in a baking dish and bake for 12 minutes, turn them over, then bake for another 12–13 minutes, until tender. Remove from oven and let cool to room temperature.

### **CRISPY FENNEL**

½ fermel bulb, trimmed and sliced thinly lengthwise by hand or with a mandolin
2 thsp or ange juice
¼ cup (60 mL) comstarch
1 tsp salt
vegetable oil, enough to cover small pot or deep frying pan 1½ in (4 cm) deep

In a bowl, combine fennel and orange juice. In a shallow bowl, sift cornstarch and salt together.

Heat oil to 350°F (180°C). Place <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) fennel slices in cornstarch and drop into oil. Fry for 1 minutes, then turn pieces over and fry for another 1 minute, until golden. Drain on paper towel. Repeat with remaining fennel.

## SMOKY PORTOBELLO MUSHROOMS 3portobellomushroomcaps, sliced

Follow instructions for the Smoky Balsamic Marinade on p.190 for marinating mushrooms. On a Silpat (nonstick) dehydrator tray, lay portobello slices and dehydrate at 115°F (46°C) degrees for 30 minutes. Alternatively, heat 2 tsp of grapeseed oil and fry slices 3 minutes on each side. Set aside.

## TO ASSEMBLE AND PLATE:

3 tbsp Mustard Vinaigrette 2 tbsp chopped fresh chives ½ lemon coarse or flaked salt, to taste

In a bowl, combine cooled potatoes, portobello mushrooms, Mustard Vinaigrette, and chives. Use a 3-in (8-cm) round mold to pile ½ cup (125 mL) of potatoes in center of plate (or pile by hand). Top with slices of crispy fennel. Squeeze lemon juice over fennel and sprinkle with salt. Drizzle remaining vinaigrette around perimeter of plate.

# WARM ROASTED BEETS WITH WILD ARUGULA, BALSAMIC MAPLE PECANS & ORANGE VINAIGRETTE

I still can't believe that I hated beets as a kid. Now I can practically eat beets at every meal. Roasting beets brings out the best of their flavor, keeping all the nutrients tucked inside.



#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

#### WARM ROASTED BEETS 3medium red or candy-striped beets 2tsp olive oil ½tsp salt

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Wash beets and trim off tops and bottoms. Rub with oil and salt and wrap in aluminum foil. Bake for 35 minutes or until soft. When beets have cooled enough to handle, skins should just rub right off. Cut into wedges and set aside.

### **ORANGE VINAIGRETTE**

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) orangejuice 1 tsp Dijon mustard <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp agavenectar 1 garlic dove <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp fresh thyme salt and ground black pepper; to taste <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) divecil In a blender or food processor, combine all ingredients except oil and blend until smooth. Slowly add oil and blend until emulsified.

Makes 1/2 cup (125 mL).

## TO ASSEMBLE AND PLATE:

6 cups (1.5 L) washed wild arugula ¼ cup (60 mL) Orange Vinaigrette Balsamic Maple Pecans (p. 200)

In a large bowl, combine Warm Roasted Beets, arugula, and Orange Vinaigrette.

Place salad in middle of a serving bowl and top with Balsamic Maple Pecans.

## PINE NUT CAESAR WITH LAVENDER BALSAMIC CROUTONS & CRISPY OYSTER MUSHROOMS

A rich, flavorful take on the very un-vegan-friendly original.

#### • MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

### PINE NUT CAESAR DRESSING

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) pinenuts
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed
3 thsp unsweetened almond or soy milk
2 thsp lemonjuice
1 thsp white wine vinegar
1 thsp Dijon mustard
1 thsp brown nice syrup
2 thsp tamari
1 thsp nutritional yeast
3 thsp capers
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> thsp ground black pepper cup (80 mL) divecil

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C).

Toast pine nuts for 5 minutes, stirring halfway, until golden and fragrant. Let cool. In a blender or food processor, combine all ingredients except oil and blend until smooth. Slowly add oil and blend until emulsified.

Makes 3/4 cup (185 mL).

### LAVENDER CROUTONS

1 tsp dried lavender f owers, crushed 1 tbsp olive oil 2 tsp white wine vinegar 2¼ cups (530 mL) cubed day-old bread (about ½ a small loaf) tsp salt tsp ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a large bowl, whisk lavender, oil, and vinegar. Add cubed bread and toss to coat. Spread on an unoiled cookie sheet and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake for 5 minutes, turn cubes over and bake for another 5 minutes, until golden brown.

Makes 21/4 cups (530 mL).

### **CRISPY OYSTER MUSHROOMS**

1 cup (250 mL) trimmed and chopped syster mushrooms 1/4 cup (60 mL) constarch, sifted 1 tsp salt grapeseed oil, enough to cover bottom of small fiying pan ½ in (1-cm) deep 1/2 lemon

In a shallow bowl, generously coat mushrooms with sifted cornstarch and salt. In a frying pan on medium-high, heat oil to 325°F (160°C). Drop mushrooms into oil and fry each side, turning after 30 seconds. Drain on paper towels. Sprinkle with a little lemon juice and serve immediately.

## TO ASSEMBLE AND PLATE:

I head romaine lettuce, washed and chopped 2 cups (500 mL) finely chopped mustard greens 2 cups (500 mL) finely chopped rainbow chard 3 tbsp capers 1 tsp flaked smoked salt Pine Nut Parmesan (p. 193)

In a large bowl, toss lettuce, mustard greens, and chard with enough Pine Nut Dressing to coat. Add capers, and 1 cup (250 mL) croutons. In shallow bowls, portion salad and top with a few crispy oyster mushrooms. Sprinkle mushrooms with a pinch of smoked salt and Pine Nut Parmesan.

## LENTIL WALNUT TOURTIÈRE WITH CARROT TAMARIND CHUTNEY & BALSAMIC REDUCTION

This is a very loose take on the traditional Quebecois meat pie eaten in the winter. I have never tasted one, but I love pies, so I came up with this savory vegan version.

#### • MAKES 8 SERVINGS.

## LENTIL WALNUT TOURTIÈRE

2 the grapeseed oil 1 mediumonion diced <sup>3</sup>/4tsp salt 1 medium canot. diced <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tspfieshthyme <sup>1</sup>/4tsp smoked paprika tspamin <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground black pepper <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp red pepper f akes 8 aemini mushrooms, diced ap (80 mL) dry white wine, or 1 thsp plus 1 tsp white wine vinegar 2tsptamari 1 tsplight miso <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tspDijonmustard  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups (625 mL) cooked green lentils 1/2 bulb roasted garlic (p. 189), minced, skins removed, or 4 garlic doves, minced cup (80mL) stock (p. 45)

2tbsprutritional yeast 1 batch Shortcrust Pastry (p. 155) ½cup (125 mL) f nely chopped toasted walnuts 1 tspmilk (nut, nice, etc.) 2tspolive oil 2tsp nutritional yeast ½tsp tamari

Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).

In a large pot on medium-high, heat oil. Add onions and salt and cook covered for 5 minutes; give it a stir halfway through cooking time. Add carrots, herbs and spices, and mushrooms. Continue cooking, stirring frequently. Add wine, 2 tsp tamari, miso, and mustard and cook down for 3 minutes. Add lentils, roasted garlic (if using), stock, and nutritional yeast and cook for 3 minutes while stirring. Remove from heat and set aside. Roll out ½ of pastry into a 12-in (30-cm) circle, ¼-in (6-mm) thick. Fold gently in half and place onto 1 side of an 8-in (20-cm) pie dish. Unfold to cover entire dish and trim edges with a knife. Roll out other half of dough to same size and set aside.

Stir walnuts into lentils. Pour lentil mix into pie dish. Top with remaining crust. Trim edges with a knife and, using a fork or 2 fingers side by side, pinch edges of crust to seal. Poke a few holes on top of crust.

In a small bowl, whisk together milk, oil, yeast, and 1 tsp tamari. With a pastry brush, lightly brush this mixture over top of pie. Bake for 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F (180C) and bake for another 20 minutes, or until edges are golden brown.

### **TO PLATE:**

Carrot Tamarind Chutney (p. 196) Balsamic Reduction (p. 205)

Cut pie into 8 wedges. Serve 1 wedge per plate with 2 tbsp chutney. Drizzle 1 tsp Balsamic Reduction around plate.

## BUTTERNUT SQUASH & ALMOND GNOCCHI Sautéed with sage garlic butter

This light autumn meal takes time to prepare, but it is well worth it, given its amazing flavors. The gnocchi can also be frozen for future use.



• MAKES 4 SERVINGS AS A MAIN, OR 6AS A STARTER.


#### **BUTTERNUT SQUASH & ALMOND GNOCCHI**

1 cup (250mL) + 1 thsp peeled and cubed buttemut squash (about ¼ small squash) 1½ cups (375mL) peeled and cubed russet potato (about 1 large potato) ¼ cup (60mL) almond butter ½ tsp salt ¼ tsp ground black pepper tsp ground nutmeg ¼ tsp ground cinnamon 2 tsp clive oil 1 cup (250mL) spet f our + additional ¾ cup (185mL) for kneading and dusting

In a pot with at least 1-in (2.5-cm) water, fill a steamer basket, bamboo steamer, or metal sieve with squash and potatoes. Cover and bring water to a boil on medium heat. Steam for 10 minutes, until squash and potatoes are very tender. Transfer to a bowl to let cool slightly.

If you have a ricer, rice the squash and potatoes, or use a potato masher and then use a fork to mash squash and potatoes thoroughly. Add almond butter, salt, pepper, nutmeg, cinnamon, and oil, and mash until combined. Slowly add 1 cup flour, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) at a time, until entire cup is used and a sticky dough forms.

Turn out onto a floured surface and gently knead until



smooth, for about 3 minutes, adding another <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) flour if needed. Generously flour a clean work surface. Gently roll out <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) dough at a time to form a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-in (1-cm) thick cylinder. Use a sharp knife to cut cylinder into <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-in rounds. Place in a floured baking pan and cover with a tea towel. Repeat with remaining dough. (At this point, you can freeze dough to use at a later date, transferring to a freezer bag or container once frozen.)

Lightly oil a large glass baking dish and set aside. Bring a large pot of salted water with 1 tsp olive oil to a boil. Drop in gnocchi, about 10 at a time, and cook for 4 minutes. Gnocchi should rise to top of water. Using a sieve or slotted spoon, lift gnocchi out of water, place in glass baking dish, and cover. When all gnocchi are cooked, let rest in a single layer in baking dish for 1 hour before sautéing, or store, covered, overnight in refrigerator.

Makes about 75 gnocchi.

#### SAGE GARLIC BUTTER

1 roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed 2½ tsp lemonjuice 2 tbsp nutritional yeast 1 tbsp fresh sæge leaves 2 tbsp olive oil 1 tsp white wine vinegar ¼ tsp salt ¼ tsp ground black pepper ¼ tsp red pepper f akes

In a blender or food processor, purée all ingredients until smooth. Set aside.

In a frying pan on medium heat, add 1 tbsp Sage Garlic Butter for every 18 gnocchi and sauté for 2 minutes, until gnocchi are slightly browned on both sides.

#### TO PLATE:

about 1 tbsp fresh sage leaves, for garnish

Place 10–15 gnocchi on a plate and garnish with <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp of fresh chopped sage.

## YAM & WALNUT CROQUETTES WITH COCONUT Sour Cream, ancho Balsamic Beet Reduction & Wilted Pea Shoots

These croquettes are one of my favorite dishes. I have also used the filling to make dumplings served with Cashew Cheese (p. 192) and a dusting of ground chipotle peppers.



#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

## ANCHO BALSAMIC BEET REDUCTION

1 the grapesed oil 1 mediumonion, chopped 1 tep ancho chili powder 1 the whole coriander seeds 2 whole cloves ½ tep whole peppercoms 1 sprig fresh rosemary (about a finger long) 3 garlic cloves, smashed 2tsp tamari 2mediumbeets, peeled and chopped ¼ cup balsamic vinegar 2 cups (500 mL) stock (p. 45) or water (enough to just cover the tops of the beets in saucepan)

In a large saucepan on medium-high, heat oil. Add chopped onions, spices, and rosemary and cook until

onions are translucent. Add garlic and tamari and cook for another 2 minutes. Add beets, vinegar, and stock. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer until <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> of liquid has reduced and beets are cooked, about 20 minutes.

Remove rosemary sprig, peppercorns, and cloves. In a blender, purée beet mixture, adding more water if necessary, until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids. This sauce can be made ahead of time and reheated.

#### YAM & WALNUT CROQUETTES

1 largeyam 1 thep grapeseed oil 1 mediumanian, chopped <sup>1</sup>/2tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground cinnamon <sup>1</sup>/4tsp garammasala <sup>1</sup>/4tsp cayenne pepper 1 tsp balsamic vinegar 1 cup (250 mL) to asted and roughly chopped walnuts <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) Cashew Cheese (p. 192) 1/4 cup (60 mL) nutritional yeast 1 tsp salt 1 tsp ground black pepper 1/2 cup (125 mL) chickpeaf cur <sup>1</sup>/2tsp smoked paprika <sup>1</sup>/2tsp salt grapeseed or walnut oil, for fiying

Preheat oven to 375°F (180°C).

Wrap yam in aluminum foil and bake for 30–40 minutes. When soft, remove from oven and let cool. Peel off skin.

In a frying pan on medium, heat grapeseed oil. Stir in onions, sprinkle with salt, and cover pan. Cook for about 2 minutes, stir again, then continue to cook for another 2–3 minutes. Uncover and add spices and balsamic vinegar. Reduce heat to medium and cook down until onions are soft and caramelized.

In a large bowl add cooled, peeled yam. With a potato masher or immersion blender, mash until just smooth: should make about 1½ cups (375 mL). Stir in walnuts, Cashew Cheese, yeast, salt and pepper, and cooked onions. Use ¼ cup (80 mL) of mix at a time to

form croquettes <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-in (1-cm) thick. Set aside.

In a shallow bowl, combine chickpea flour, paprika, and salt. In a frying pan on medium-high heat, add generous coating of oil. Dredge croquettes in flour mix and fry each side for 2–3 minutes, until golden brown and crispy. Serve immediately or transfer to oven to keep warm.

#### WILTED PEA SHOOTS

#### 1 tsp grapeseed oil 3 cups (750 mL) peashoots, trimmed and washed salt, to taste

In a frying pan on medium-high, heat oil. Add pea shoots and sauté, stirring constantly for 1–2 minutes, just until slightly wilted. Season with a little sprinkle of salt.

### TO PLATE:

Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) ¼ cup (60 mL) chopped fresh cilantro, for garnish 3 tbsp toasted chopped walnuts

Spoon about 1–2 tbsp beet reduction across middle of a plate. Place small pile of pea shoots in center and angle 2 croquettes on top. Place 1 tbsp Coconut Sour Cream on side of plate and garnish with chopped walnuts and fresh cilantro.



## BLUE CORN EMPANADAS WITH PECANS, BLACK BEANS, MOLE PIPIÁN, RED CABBAGE & AVOCADO

Mole Pipián is a Mexican sauce that uses pumpkin or squash seeds instead of chocolate, which give it a beautiful green color. Avocado leaves are sold in Mexican food stores. If you can't find them, substitute 1 bay leaf and ¼ tsp crushed anise seeds.

#### • MAKES 8 SERVINGS.

## **MOLE PIPIÁN**

6 tomatillos 1 jalapeño pepper 1 green bell pepper 2 tsp whole cumin sæds 2 thsp grapesæd oil 1 medium Spanish onion, chopped 2 gadic doves, smæhed 2 dried avocado leaves 1½ cups (375 mL) pumpkin sæds -1 cup (160-250 mL) stock (p. 45) 1 tsp salt, to taste

Preheat oven to 325°F (160°C).

On an unoiled cookie sheet, roast whole tomatillos with jalapeño and bell peppers, for 20 minutes. When soft, remove from oven and let cool.

Meanwhile, in a dry frying pan on medium heat, toast cumin seeds until fragrant, then add oil. Add onions and garlic and sauté for 5 minutes, until onions are translucent.

Remove seeds from bell pepper and stalks from jalapeño and tomatillos. In a food processor or blender, purée roasted vegetables with onion mixture, garlic, avocado leaves, pumpkin seeds, and stock (if mixture is too thick, add more stock). Season with salt, to taste. This can be made ahead and reheated before serving.

### **RED CABBAGE**

1 cup (250mL) f nely shredded red cabbage 2 tsp vinegar ½ tsp agave nectar ¼-½ tsp salt

In a bowl, combine all ingredients and let sit for 15 minutes before serving.

### **BLACK BEAN FILLING**

14tsp cumin seeds 1 tsp grapeseed oil 1 mediumSpanish onion, f nely chopped 1⁄2 jalapeño pepper; f nely chopped and seeded 3 gardic cloves, f nely chopped 1⁄2 tsp salt 3 thsp orange juice 11⁄2 cups (375 mL) cooked black beans 1⁄4 cup (60 mL) stock 1 tsp lime juice salt, to taste

In a saucepan or large frying pan on medium-high heat, toast cumin seeds until fragrant. Add oil and onions and sauté until translucent. Add jalapeño pepper, garlic, and



salt. Stir in orange juice and simmer for 2 minutes. Stir in black beans and stock. Reduce heat and simmer for 3 minutes, stirring often. Add lime juice and season with extra salt if needed.

#### **BLUE CORN EMPANADA DOUGH**

½cup (125 mL) f neblue commal (or yellowif blue unavailable)
1 up (250 mL) f nespelt or wheat f our
½ tsp salt
2 tbsp f nely chopped toasted pecars
2 tbsp grapeseed or dive oil
¼ cup (60 mL) water

Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).

In a bowl combine cornmeal, flour, salt, and pecans. Make a well in the center of dry mix and pour in oil and water. Mix until the dough starts to come together; add more water as needed. Try not to over-mix. Let dough rest, covered, for 20 minutes.

On a lightly floured surface, roll out about 2 tbsp dough to a 5-in (12-cm) wide circle, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. Place <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) black bean filling in middle of circle. Keep a small bowl of water nearby. Using your fingers or a pastry brush, wet edges then fold dough in half and, using a fork, press edges down to seal. Set on a baking pan dusted with cornmeal. Repeat with remaining bean filling and dough.

Bake empanadas for 12–15 minutes, until edges are golden brown.

Makes 8 empanadas.

## TO PLATE:

1 avocado, cut into 8 slices 2–3 tbsp chopped fresh cilantro, for garnish

Spoon about 3 tbsp Mole Pipián onto a plate. Add 2 tbsp cabbage. Cut an empanada in half and place over mole, overlapping each half. Add a few slices of avocado and garnish with fresh cilantro.

## BROWN RICE RISOTTO WITH KIDNEY BEANS & ANISE-TOASTED SUNFLOWER SEEDS

A simple and filling dish that's great when served with a simple green salad.

#### • MAKES 4 6SERVINGS.

#### **BROWN RICE RISOTTO WITH KIDNEY BEANS**

<sup>1</sup>/4tsp whole currin seeds 2 tbsp grapeseed oil 3 garlic doves, minced 1 mediumanian, chopped <sup>1</sup>/2tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp ground black pepper <sup>1</sup>/4tspgarammasala (p. 210) <sup>1</sup>/4tsp ground turmeric <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp chili powder <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp smoked paprika <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp red pepper f akes 1 tsp tomato paste 1 cup uncooked short grain brown rice 2tbspdrywhitewine 1 mediumtamata diced 1 cup (250 mL) peeled and cubed white sweet potatoes 1 cup (250 mL) cooked kidney beans 21/2 cups (625 mL) stock (p. 45) or water

In a large pot in medium-high heat, toast cumin seeds for 1–2 minutes until fragrant. Add oil, garlic, and onions and sauté for 3 minutes, until onions are translucent. Add remainder of spices, tomato paste, and rice and stir constantly for about 3 minutes. When rice begins to look translucent, add wine and cook for another 1–2 minutes. Add tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and kidney beans and stir to combine.

Slowly add 1 cup of stock or water, stirring occasionally for 5 minutes; slowly stir in 1 more cup. Reduce heat and let simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent scorching. When risotto starts to look thicker and water is absorbed, add another ½ cup (125 mL) stock or water, reduce heat to low, cover, and cook for 15 minutes, until rice is tender. Remove from heat and let sit for 5 minutes before serving.

### TO PLATE:

coarse smoked salt, to taste olive oil, to garnish Anise-Toasted Sunflower Seeds (p. 201)

Portion risotto into shallow bowls. Sprinkle with smoked salt and a drizzle of olive oil, and top with the Anise-Toasted Sunflower Seeds.

## PAN-FRIED PURPLE POTATO & CABBAGE DUMPLINGS WITH CILANTRO PESTO

These simple little dumplings pack a colorful and tasty surprise.

#### • MAKES 8 SERVINGS.

### **CILANTRO PESTO**

2 thsp Cashew Cheese (p. 192) or 3 thsp roasted and chopped valuuts 1 garlic dove ½ firsh jalapeño pepper; seeded and chopped 3 tsp lime juice ½ tsp salt 2 cups (500 mL) lightly packed firsh cilantro cup (80 mL) lightly packed basil leaves ¼ cup (60 mL) olive oil

In a blender or food processor, purée all ingredients until smooth.

Makes 3/4 cup (185 mL).

## PAN-FRIED PURPLE POTATO & CABBAGE DUMPLINGS


½lb (250g) purple potatoes, peeled, if necessary, and cubed, about 3½ cups (830 mL)
2 thsp water
1 thsp olive oil
½roasted garlic bulb (p. 189), skins removed, minced
1 thsp grapeseed oil
1 medium red onion, diced
1½ cups (375 mL) finely shredded red cabbage

#### <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp ground black pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp red pepper f akes 1 tsp tamari 2 tsp balsamic vinegar 13 oz (370-g) pkg round vegan wonton wrappers

In a pot filled with at least 1 in (2.5 cm) water on medium-high heat, place a 6-in (15-cm) diameter steam basket, add potatoes, cover, and bring to a boil. Steam for 15–20 minutes, until cooked through. Transfer potatoes to a bowl. Add 2 tbsp water, olive oil, and garlic and mash with a potato masher until smooth. Set aside.

In a frying pan over medium, heat grapeseed oil. Add onions and sauté until translucent. Add cabbage, salt, pepper, and red pepper flakes. Sauté for 2 minutes, then add tamari and vinegar. Reduce heat and continue to cook until cabbage and onions are soft. Add to potatoes and mix to combine well.

On a clean work surface like a cutting board, lay out a few wonton wrappers. Keep a small bowl of water nearby. Place 2 tsp Purple Potato filling in middle of each wrapper. With your finger or a small brush, dampen edges of each wrapper with water. Fold in half, pressing edges closed to seal. Position dumplings so seams face up; press slightly to create flat bottoms. Place on a parchment



lined cookie sheet and cover with damp tea towel or paper towel. Repeat with remaining filling and wrappers. (At this point, you can freeze the dumplings, transferring to a freezer bag or container once frozen. They will also keep covered in the refrigerator for 1 day.)

Makes 38-40 dumplings.

To pan-fry fresh dumplings: In a frying pan on medium, heat 1 tbsp grapeseed oil. Add dumplings, flat side down, and cover pan. Cook for 1–2 minutes, until bottoms are golden, then lay them on 1 side. Cook uncovered for 1 minute, then turn over and cook other side for 1 minute, until golden.

To pan-fry frozen dumplings: Remove from freezer 5-10 minutes before cooking. Let bottom side cook, covered, for 3 minutes, until golden, then cook each side, covered, for 1-2 minutes. Reduce heat if they start to brown too quickly.

## **TO PLATE:**

1/4 cup (60 mL) chopped fresh cilantro

On a square or rectangular plate, diagonally spread 1 tbsp Cilantro Pesto across middle. Place 5 dumplings across pesto. Garnish with 1 tsp cilantro.

## HAZELNUT-CRUSTED PORTOBELLOS WITH CARAMELIZED FENNEL PARSNIP MASH, RADICCHIO MARMALADE & BALSAMIC PORT REDUCTION

This is a great winter dish, perfect for the holidays. The marmalade is a version of a French recipe passed down to a friend of mine and is surprisingly sweet and flavorful—an unusual use of such a bitter lettuce. (See recipe photo, p.82)

#### • MAKES 6 SERVINGS.

#### RADICCHIO MARMALADE

¼cup (60mL) dive oil or Earth Balance vegan margarine
1 head radiachio letture, f nely chopped
½cup (125mL) maple syrup
¼cup (60mL) balsamic vinegar
½cup (125mL) orange juice
1 bay leaf
½tsp fresh thyme
½tsp ground black pepper
1 whole dove
½cinnamon stick, about 1-in (2.5 cm) long
2 juniper benies, crushed

In a medium pot on medium heat, melt olive oil or vegan margarine. Add radicchio and sauté for 3 minutes. When radicchio begins to soften, add maple syrup and continue to cook for 5 minutes, until soft and caramelized. Add remainder of ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce to a simmer and cook, stirring often, for about 10 minutes, until marmalade is thick and jam-like.

### **BALSAMIC PORT REDUCTION**

In a saucepan on medium-high, heat oil. Add garlic and sage and sauté for 1 minute. Add peppercorns, clove, and portobello stalks and sauté for 1 minute. Add wine, vinegar, and bay leaves and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to a high simmer for 15 minutes, until sauce has reduced slightly. Remove from heat, let cool, and strain, reserving sauce and discarding spices, garlic, and mushroom stalks. Reheat before serving.

#### HAZELNUT-CRUSTED PORTOBELLOS

In a bowl, whisk together vinegar, port, tamari, oil, liquid smoke, mustard, pepper, yeast, and cornstarch. In a large freezer bag or plastic container with lid, place mushrooms, garlic, and rosemary. Pour in marinade and seal bag or container. Let sit for at least 30 minutes, or up to 2 hours.

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

In a shallow bowl, add hazelnuts. Take 1 mushroom at a time from the marinade and dip into hazelnuts, making sure each is well-coated. Place on a lightly oiled baking sheet. Sprinkle with smoked salt before placing in oven. Bake for 12 minutes, turn mushrooms over, then bake for another 12–13 minutes, until hazelnuts are toasted and mushrooms are cooked.

#### CARAMELIZED FENNEL PARSNIP MASH

10 parsnips, trimmed and peeled 1 garlic bulb, dowes separated 2 thsp olive oil ½ tsp salt 2 thsp grapeseed oil 1 large fermel bulb or 2 small, trimmed and sliced thinly, lengthwise ½ tsp salt ½ tsp balsamic vinegar

#### 1-3tbsp dive al 1-3tbsp unsweetened milk (nut, rice, etc.) ½tsp ground black pepper ½tsp cayenne pepper (optional) salt, to taste

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Place parsnips in a glass baking dish or into aluminum foil packets with about 2 parsnips per packet, along with 2 or 3 garlic cloves. Rub parsnips and garlic with 2 tbsp olive oil and sprinkle with salt. Tightly close packets or cover baking dish with foil and bake for 25-40 minutes, or until parsnips are soft.

Meanwhile, in a frying pan on medium, heat grapeseed oil. Add fennel and sauté for 1 minute. Season with salt, cover, and cook for 5 minutes. Stir fennel and cover for another 5 minutes. Add vinegar and cook for another 5 minutes or so until fennel is lightly caramelized and getting soft. Remove from heat.

Roughly chop cooked parsnips and add to large heatproof bowl or pot, along with garlic and any reserved oil. Add 1–3 tbsp olive oil, milk, pepper, and cayenne and, using a potato masher or immersion blender, mash until smooth. Add more milk if mixture is too thick. Stir in caramelized fennel and season with salt to taste.

## TO PLATE:

Cut each mushroom in half and place in the middle of a rectangular plate. Spoon 2 tbsp of port sauce over mushrooms. Place <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) of parsnip mash on 1 side and 1 tbsp of marmalade on the other.

## LEEK & OYSTER MUSHROOM RISOTTO CAKES WITH YELLOW BEET REDUCTION

A different way to serve a classic risotto. The oyster mushrooms give a slight seafood flavor to the dish.

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

## LEEK & OYSTER MUSHROOM RISOTTO CAKES

4-5 cups (1-1.25L) stock (p. 45) or well-salted water 1 the polive ail 2 cups (550 mL) chopped and trimmed leeks 1 tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground black pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp red pepper f akes tsp kelp povder <sup>1</sup>/4tsp dulse f akes 3 garlic doves, minced 1½ cups (375 mL) trimmed and sliced syster mushrooms 1 cups (395 mL) arbonionice cup (80mL) drywhitewine 1 the polive oil 3tbsp Cashew Cheese (optional, p. 192) <sup>1</sup>/4 ap (60 mL) rice four 1 the ground fax seeds panko bread crumbs, for dredging grapeseed oil, for frying

In a pot on medium-low, heat stock or water until just under a boil; keep at constant temperature.

Meanwhile, in a large pot on medium-high, heat 1 tbsp olive oil. Add leeks and sauté until softened. Add salt, pepper, red pepper flakes, kelp, dulse, and garlic. Add oyster mushrooms and continue to sauté until softened. Add rice and stir constantly, cooking for 4 minutes, until rice becomes translucent. Add wine and continue to cook, stirring occasionally.

When wine has cooked off, add hot stock, 1 cup at a time, stirring constantly until stock is mostly evaporated and absorbed by rice before adding more. Reduce heat to medium; when you pause stirring, slow, lazy bubbles should rise to surface. Keep adding stock until rice is cooked and soft, about 20 minutes. Risotto should be a little thicker than a traditional one. Remove from heat.

Stir in 1 tbsp olive oil and Cashew Cheese and season with salt, to taste. Spread on an unoiled cookie sheet to let cool evenly.

In a large bowl, combine risotto with rice flour and flax. Form into 2-in (5-cm) wide, 1-in (2.5-cm) thick cakes. In a large frying pan on medium-high, heat a generous amount of grapeseed oil. Dredge top and bottom of each cake in shallow bowl of panko crumbs. Fry on each side for 5 minutes, or until golden.

Makes about 15 risotto cakes.



### **YELLOW BEET REDUCTION**

1 tsp grapesæd oll 1 mediumonion, chopped 1½ tsp salt ½ tsp cayenne pepper 1 tsp chopped firesh sæge ¼ tsp chopped firesh thyme 3 tsp whole contander sæds 2 cups cubed yellowbeets 3 tsp white wine vinegar 2 cups (500 mL) stock (p. 45)

In pot on medium, heat oil. Add onions and salt and sauté until onions are translucent. Add cayenne, sage, thyme, and coriander. Add beets and vinegar and cook for 4 minutes. Add stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes. In a blender, purée all ingredients until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

## TO PLATE:

Spoon 2 tbsp of Beet Reduction on a plate. Place 2 Risotto Cakes on top.

## PIPIÁN PESTO TORTELLINI WITH SEARED ASPARAGUS පි ROASTED Tomatillo Sauce

Ever since I've been living in New York, I've been influenced by the abundance of Latin American foods found in grocery stores. This recipe is a result of that, filled with fresh, bright flavors. I use vegan wonton wrappers for the tortellini, which taste very similar to home-made vegan pasta, but are much less labor-intensive.

#### • MAKES 4 SERVINGS AS A MAIN OR 6 APPETIZER PORTIONS.

## PIPIÁN PESTO TORTELLINI

1 tsp grapeseed oil 1 shallot, diced 3 garlic dowes, minced cup (80mL) pumpkin seed butter 1 thsp lemonjuice <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp salt, to taste 1 cup (250mL) lightly packed fresh cilantro 1 cup (250mL) lightly packed fresh parsley <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60mL) dive cil 1 13 cz (370 g) pkg round vegan wonton wrappers (approximately 64 wrappers)

In a small frying pan on medium, heat grapeseed oil. Add shallots and garlic and sauté until shallots are translucent. In a food processor or blender, blend shallots and garlic, pumpkin seed butter, lemon juice, salt, cilantro, and parsley. Slowly add olive oil to facilitate blending.

On a clean work surface, lay out a few wonton wrappers. Keep a small bowl of water nearby. Place 1 tsp filling in middle of each wrapper. With your finger or a small brush, dampen edges of each wrapper. Fold in half, pressing edges closed to seal. Dampen 1 corner of semi-circle and bring to center of tortellini; fold other corner over top. Squeeze gently to make sure corners stick together. Place on a parchment-lined cookie sheet and cover with damp tea towel or paper towel. Repeat with remaining filling and wrappers. (At this point, you can freeze the tray of tortellini, transferring to a freezer bag or container once frozen.)

Makes 28 tortellini.

Fill a large pot with well-salted water. Bring to a boil on high heat. Drop fresh or frozen tortellini into water and bring back to a boil. Cook for 2 minutes if fresh, 4 minutes if frozen. Tortellini will rise to top of water when done. Drain and set aside.

#### **ROASTED TOMATILLO SAUCE**

34lb (375g) or 5 medium to matillos, husks removed 4 unpeeled gadic doves 2 tspolive oil 14 tsp salt 1 tbspolive oil 14 tsp fresh thyme





#### <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> jalapeño pepper; seeded and chopped <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> tsp salt <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> tsp pepper <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> tsp agave nectar

Preheat oven to 325°F (160°C).

Rub tomatillos and garlic with 2 tbsp olive oil and sprinkle with ¼ tsp salt. Bake on an unoiled baking sheet for 20 minutes, until soft. Peel garlic. In a food processor or blender, process tomatillos and garlic with remainder of ingredients until smooth.

### **SEARED ASPARAGUS**

2tsp grapeseed oil 1 bunch asparagus, trimmed and sliced in half lengthwise, if very thick salt, to taste In a saucepan over medium-high, heat oil. Add asparagus and season with salt. Sauté for 2–4 minutes, until slightly browned and soft. Set aside

## TO PLATE:

chopped fresh cilantro, to garnish olive oil, to garnish

Toss tortellini with sauce. Portion into 4 shallow bowls (or 6, if serving as an appetizer). Place a few asparagus spears over top of pasta and garnish with chopped cilantro and olive oil.

## COCONUT FETTUCINE ALFREDO WITH SEARED BRUSSELS SPROUTS පි CHERRY TOMATOES

This is one of the first recipes I made when VSS started. It's rich and creamy, and by no means a traditional take on the original.

#### • MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

#### COCONUT FETTUCINE ALFREDO

1 lb (500g) dry fettucine 1 tsp olive oil 2 tsp grapeseed oil 3 garlie dowes, minced 2 tsp minced sun-dried tomatoes 1/4 tsp salt, (more, to taste) 1/2 tsp ground black pepper 1/4 tsp red pepper f akes (optional) 1 thsp tamari 2 tsp white wine vinegar 1 thsp nutritional yeast 2 thsp tahini 1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk 1 tsp lime juice salt, to taste

In a large pot, bring at least 4 qt (L) heavily salted water to a boil. Add pasta and olive oil and boil for 6–8 minutes, stirring occasionally and checking tenderness after 6 minutes. Drain in a colander.

Meanwhile, in a pot on medium-high, heat grapeseed oil. Add garlic, sun-dried tomatoes, salt, black pepper, and red pepper flakes and sauté for 1 minute. Add tamari, vinegar, nutritional yeast, and tahini. Slowly whisk in coconut milk. Reduce heat and bring to a slow simmer, whisking regularly. When simmering, add lime juice and season with salt, if needed. Remove from heat. Pour strained noodles back into pot and stir into sauce.

#### SEARED BRUSSELS SPROUTS & CHERRY TOMATOES

2 tsp grapeseed oil 20 Brussels sprouts, trimmed and out in half lengthwise 20 cheny tomatoes, out in half 1 tsp balsamic vinegar salt and ground black pepper; to taste

In a large frying pan on high, heat oil. Add Brussels sprouts and sear, flat side down, for 3 minutes. Add tomatoes and balsamic vinegar. Season with salt and pepper and sauté for another 3 minutes.

### TO PLATE:

Pile a portion of pasta in the middle of a shallow bowl. Spoon a few Brussels sprouts and tomatoes around the edges.

## SNIVIA

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This is my favorite gluten-free crust, with all of my favorite things on top, to create my other favorite thing: pizza.



#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

### MISO SESAME SHIITAKE MUSHROOMS (P. 190)

Follow instructions for this recipe, but do not dehydrate. These can be made first, and marinate while you prep the rest.

#### ROASTED GOLDEN BEETS 2mediumgeldenbeets

2tspolivecil ½tspsalt

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Wash beets and trim off tops and bottoms. Rub skins with oil and salt and wrap in aluminum foil. Bake for 35 minutes or until soft. When beets have cooled enough to handle, skin should just rub right off. Cut into slices or small cubes. Set aside.

#### WILD ARUGULA PESTO

4 garlic doves 3 thsp lemon juice 1 tsp salt ½ tsp ground black pepper ¼ tsp red pepper f akes 2 thsp Cashew Cheese (p. 192) 3 cups (750 mL) washed and trimmed, lightly packed augula (rocket) 3 cups (750 mL) lightly packed basil leaves ¼ cup (60 mL) olive oil

In a food processor or blender, purée garlic. Add lemon juice, salt, pepper, red pepper flakes, and Cashew Cheese. Add arugula and basil and continue to blend, slowly adding oil while blender is running.

Makes 1½ cups (375 mL).

#### **QUINOA CAULIFLOWER CRUST**

 ½head caulif ower; roughly cut into large forets

 2 thsp olive oil

 1 tsp tamari

 1 mediumred onion, diced

 2 gardic dowes, minced

 1 cup (250mL) quinca four

 1 thsp ground f axseeds

 2 thsp nutritional yeast

 1½tsp red pepper f akes (optional)

#### Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Fill a large pot with salted water and bring to a boil on high heat. Blanch cauliflower in boiling water for 3 minutes, until slightly soft but not over-cooked. Drain and set aside.

In a large bowl, combine cooked cauliflower with oil

and tamari. Mash using an immersion blender or place in a food processor and pulse until well-crumbled. (If using food processor, pour crumbled cauliflower into large bowl.) Add remainder of ingredients to bowl and combine well using a wooden spoon. Use your hands to form mixture into a sticky dough.

On a lightly oiled baking sheet, press dough into a circle or square, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-in (6-mm) thick. Bake for 10–15 minutes, until the edges are slightly golden. Set aside.

#### **TO ASSEMBLE:**

Cashew Cheese (p. 192)

Preheat oven to broil.

On pre-baked Quinoa Cauliflower Crust, spread a generous amount of pesto. Arrange beets and shiitakes evenly over crust. With a small spoon, scoop up Cashew Cheese; use another small spoon to pull small bits of cheese onto pizza. Broil for about 5 minutes, until shiitakes are roasted. Cut into rectangles or wedges.

### WILD RICE DUMPLINGS WITH PUMPKIN LEMONGRASS CURRY

The filling for these dumplings is also great when formed into patties for veggie burgers. You can use any vegetable you want in this curry: eggplant is quite good, as is tofu, bell peppers, or zucchini. The curry paste can be frozen in ice cube trays and used later (4 cubes per can of coconut milk).

#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

#### WILD RICE DUMPLINGS

1 cup (250 mL) mixed uncooked wild, red, andbrownrice <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) uncooked red lentils 21/2 cups (625 mL) stock (p. 45) 1 tsp tomato paste 2tsptamari 1 tsp almond butter 1 tsp grapeseed oil 1 mediumshallot. diced 1 tspfnely grated fresh ginger 2 garlic doves, fnely chopped 1 tspground cumin <sup>1</sup>/2tsp ground contander <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp ground cinnamon 1/2 cup (125 mL) dickpeaf our <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) chopped firesh cilantro salt. to taste

In a large pot on medium-high heat, cook rice and red lentils, uncovered, in stock for about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. When rice has absorbed enough water that water level is below rice, reduce heat to lowest setting, cover, and cook for 20 minutes. When rice is cooked, stir in tomato paste, tamari, and almond butter. Spread on an unoiled cookie sheet to cool evenly.

While rice cooks, in a pan on medium, heat oil. Add shallots, ginger, and garlic and sauté until shallots are

translucent. Set aside to cool. In a large bowl, combine shallot mixture, rice, and lentils with cumin, coriander, and cinnamon. Add chickpea flour, stir in chopped cilantro, and season to taste with salt.

Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).

Use ¼ cup (60 mL) of mixture to form round dumplings and place on an unoiled cookie sheet. Place about ½ tsp of coconut oil on each dumpling and bake for 10 minutes. Turn dumplings over and bake for another 10 minutes, until golden.

#### PUMPKIN LEMONGRASS CURRY

1 cup (250 mL) pumpkinpurée 1 stalk lemongrass 1/4 cup (60 mL) chopped shallots 1 large "thumb" ginger; grated 3 garlie dowes, chopped 1 thsp coriander seeds (or 2 tsp ground) 1/2 tsp ground cimranon 1-3 fresh T ai chilies, diced (or 1 tsp cayerne pepper) 1 tsp tomato paste 1 tsp tamari 1 tsp can esugar 1/2 tsp salt 2 14 oz (398 mL) can s coconut milk

#### 1½ cups (375 mL) quartered nugget potatoes 1 cup (250 mL) whole snap peas, ends trimmed

To make curry paste: In a sturdy blender or food processor, blend pumpkin purée, lemongrass (only if you are using a Vitamix blender; otherwise, set aside), shallots, ginger, garlic, coriander, cumin, cinnamon, chilies, tomato paste, tamari, sugar, and salt. If mixture is too thick, add 1 can coconut milk to curry paste. (You can freeze half now and use only ½ can of coconut milk when cooking.)

If making full recipe, add second can of coconut milk and blended curry paste to a saucepan over medium heat. If you didn't add lemongrass to paste, cut it into 4 or 5 large chunks and add it now. Simmer slowly for about 15 minutes. Reduce heat to low and add potatoes. Simmer until they are soft. Add peas and cook for about 5 minutes. Remove lemongrass stalks before serving.

#### TO PLATE:

2-3 tbsp fresh basil and/or cilantro chopped, for garnish

Ladle a serving of curry into a shallow bowl. Top with 3 dumplings and garnish with basil or cilantro.

### MISO & JAPANESE EGGPLANT PIEROGIES WITH RAINBOW CARROT SHISO SLAW & COCONUT SOUR CREAM

Shiso is a fresh herb used in Japanese cooking. With distinct cinnamon, mint, and clove flavors and a slight savory spiciness, shiso is great in salads or cooked foods. I first made this recipe when catering a friend's wedding; her only request to me had been to incorporate shiso in the menu. She was happy with the result!



#### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

#### **MISO & JAPANESE EGGPLANT PIEROGIES**

For marinade <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) shiro miso 4 tsp grated fresh ginger 1 tbsp seasoned rice vinegar 1 tbsp orange juice

2tspægavenedar 1tsptamari 1tbspvæter 2tspsesame oil

#### 2tbsp grapeseed oil 1½lb (750g) Japanese eggplant or about 6 small or 3 large eggplants; halved ½cup (125mL) water ¼cup (60mL) chopped green onions ½batch Pierogi Dough (p. 128) with 1 tbsp wasabi powder added when mixing four and salt

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a bowl, combine marinade ingredients. On an unoiled baking sheet with rolled edges, arrange eggplant, cut sides up, and generously brush with marinade. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup water to the sheet. Bake for 20–25 minutes, until eggplant is tender, turning eggplant over in last 5 minutes. Let cool on sheet.

Meanwhile, prepare Pierogi Dough and let sit, covered.

When eggplant is cool enough to handle, dice and place in a large bowl. Add any marinade liquids and stir in green onions.

Generously flour a clean work surface and knead dough for 2 minutes, adding more flour if necessary. Using <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) at a time, roll out with a floured rolling pin until <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. Use a pierogi maker or 3-in (8-cm) round cutter to cut circles. Place 2 tsp filling in center of each circle. Fold circle in half, smooth out any air bubbles, and pinch closed. If dough is too dry, dampen edges with water to seal. Place pierogies on a floured baking sheet. (At this point, you can freeze the pierogies on tray and transfer to a freezer bag or container once frozen.) You may leave them at room temperature or in the refrigerator for 1 hour before cooking.

Makes 25-30 pierogies.

To pan-fry fresh pierogies: Heat 1 tbsp grapeseed oil in a frying pan on medium. Add pierogies, flat side down, and cover pan. Cook for 1-2 minutes then turn over when golden. Cook other side for another 1-2 minutes, until golden.

For frozen pierogies, remove from freezer 5–10 minutes before cooking. Let each side cook for 3 minutes, covered, reducing heat if they start to brown too quickly.

#### **GINGER SHISO DRESSING**

1 tsp grated freshginger 1 gadic dow; f nely diced or crushed 2 thsp f nely dropped fresh shiso 2 tsp f nely dropped fresh cilantro ½ tsp Dijon mistard 2 tsp apple cider vinegar 1 thsp seasoned nice vinegar 1 thsp brown nice syrup ½ tsp Sniracha (T ai hot sauce) (optional) 2 tsp nutritional yeast ¾ tsp toasted sesame oil 2 tsp olive oil

In a bowl, whisk all ingredients together until emulsified.

Makes 1/4 cup (60 mL).

#### **RAINBOW CARROT SLAW**

1 bunch rainbow canots julierned 2 tbsp julierned fresh shiso leaves

In a bowl, combine Ginger Shiso Dressing, carrots, and shiso leaves.


#### TO PLATE:

Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195)

Pile ¼ cup (60 mL) carrot slaw in middle of a plate. Arrange 3–4 pierogies around slaw. Place 1 tbsp Coconut Sour Cream on side of plate.

### SHERRY-ROASTED ROOT VEGETABLES ON BROWN RICE KALE PILAF WITH TAHINI BUTTER

A simple winter dish. The root vegetables can also be served on their own, topped with Shortcrust Pastry (p. 155) before baking, for a root-pot pie.



#### • MAKES 8 SERVINGS.

#### TAHINI BUTTER

2tbsp tahini 2tbsp lemonjuice 1 roasted garlic bulb, skins removed 3tsp tamari 1 tsp maple syrup 2tbsp nutritional yeast ½tsp Dijon mustard ¼tsp cayerne pepper ¼cup (60 mL) water ¼cup (60 mL) divecil

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients except oil. With blender running, slowly add oil until emulsified.

Makes 1 cup (250 mL).

#### SHERRY ROASTED ROOT VEGETABLES

¼cup (60mL) sheny
1 the tamari
1 tep ta

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a bowl, combine sherry, tamari, lemon juice, maple syrup, red pepper flakes, and rosemary. In a small bowl, whisk water and cornstarch together. Set aside.

In a large pot on medium-high heat, combine root vegetables and sherry mixture. Stir and cook for 3 minutes. Add cornstarch mix and continue to cook for another 3 minutes. Pour vegetables into a baking dish and cover with lid or aluminum foil. Bake covered for 20–25 minutes, until tender, then uncovered for 5 minutes.

#### **BROWN RICE KALE PILAF**

2 tsp grapesæd oll 1 mediumshallot, sliced thinly <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp salt 3 cups (750 mL) tightly packed chopped kale 1 tsp tamari 2 cups (500 mL) cooked short grain brown rice <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) Tahini Butter

In a large frying pan on medium, heat oil. Add shallots and salt and sauté until shallots are translucent. Add kale and tamari and stir for 1–2 minutes. Remove from heat.

In a large bowl, combine cooked rice with kale and add Tahini Butter. Stir to combine well.

#### TO PLATE:

3 tsp toasted sesame seeds ½ cup (125 mL) Tahini Butter

On a round shallow bowl or plate, place ¼ cup (80 mL) pilaf. Spoon 2 tbsp Tahini Butter around rice. Add ½ cup (125 mL) root vegetables and top with a sprinkle of sesame seeds.

This versatile recipe will make 2 large pizza shells, 10 10-in (25-cm) crispy flat bread crackers, or 1 loaf of bread.

# ½tspmaplesyrup 1 cup warm (body temperature) water 1 tsp active dry yeast 2 thsp olive oil 2-3 cups (500-750 mL) four (most combinations of four work great, eg, 1 part rye, 3 parts spelt) clive oil, to coat dough see Dough Variations, next page

In a large bowl, mix maple syrup with warm water. Sprinkle with yeast, cover bowl, and set aside for 10 minutes until yeast blooms. Stir in oil, then slowly add flour, using a spoon at first, then switching to your hands. Knead dough for 10 minutes, until a smooth ball forms. Lightly coat ball with olive oil and place in a clean bowl. Cover with a towel and let rise in a warm, draft-free spot for 2 hours, until dough doubles in size.

To make bread, turn out dough onto a lightly floured surface. Knead a couple of times. Gently form into a loaf by tucking in sides of dough, forming a tight outside layer that helps loaf rise upright. Place loaf on a lightly floured or lightly cornmeal-covered baking sheet or pizza stone. Alternatively, you can place loaf into a lightly floured loaf pan. Cover with a tea towel and place in a draft-free spot for 1–2 hours, until loaf has doubled in size.

Preheat oven to 375°F (180°C).

If your oven runs a bit hot, brush top of loaf with water or milk before baking to prevent it from browning too quickly Bake for 45 minutes.

#### **DOUGH VARIATIONS**

Add to dough when adding flour.

#### OLIVE

<sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) pitted and chopped kalamata dives

#### SUN-DRIED TOMATOES & BASIL

cup (80mL) chopped sundried tomatoes and 2 tbsp chopped firesh basil

**PIZZA DOUGH** 

#### 1 recipeAll-PurposeEverythingDough (p. 119)

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Divide proofed dough in half. Turn out onto lightly floured surface and knead for 5 minutes. Let rest for 30 minutes. Roll dough into a large circle or rectangle, 10-in (25-cm) wide and  $\frac{1}{4}-\frac{1}{2}-\ln(\frac{1}{2}-1-cm)$  thick. Add toppings of your choice and bake on a cornmeal-dusted baking sheet or pizza pan for 20 minutes.

### **CRISPY FLATBREAD CRACKERS**

You can make these crackers plain or you can add any of the variations below, which can be either brushed on top of the crackers or added to the plain dough when mixing in the flour. (See recipe photo, p.116.)

#### • MAKES 10 10 IN 25 CM CRACKERS OR ABOUT 80SMALL CRACKERS.

#### PESTO

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) divecil 2 thsp nutritional yeast 3 thsp chopped fresh basil 1 crushed gardic dove 1 thsp lemon juice

#### **BALSAMIC LAVENDER**

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) divecil 2 thsp balsanic vinegar <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp pepper 1 thsp dried lavender fowers (or fresh rosenary)

#### SWEET MUSTARD


<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) divecil 1 thsp grainy mustard <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp apple cider vinegar 2 tsp brown rice syrup

#### GARLIC

#### <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) divecil 2 thsp nutritional yeast 2 garlic doves, crushed 1 tsp lemon juice

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C) and preheat an unoiled cookie sheet or cast iron griddle.

Divide proofed dough into 10 sections. Lightly oil rolling surface and rolling pin, then roll out each section to about 10-in (25 cm), <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. (Alternatively, roll out 2 tsp of dough into a 5-in [12-cm] long oval and cut into small cracker shapes.) Brush crackers with any of the above variations, or simply sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place on preheated cookie sheet. Bake for 3–5 minutes until slightly golden and crispy.



### DARK HAZELNUT RYE BREAD

### HAZELNUT RYE CRISPS

This dense, chocolaty rye bread is one of my favorites.

Using the same recipe as for the rye bread, you can make crisps, which are amazing served with Cashew Cheese (p. 192) or paired with Beet & Cabbage Soup (p. 55).

#### • MAKES 2 SMALL LOAVES.

1 thsp maple syrup 2 cups (500 mL) warmwater 2½4 cz (65 g) pkg yeast 2 thsp olive cil 2 thsp molasses 1 cup (250 mL) to asted hazel nuts 3 cups (750 mL) dark ryef our 2½ cups (625 mL) spelt or wheat f our 1 thsp salt clive cil, to coat dough

In a large bowl, mix maple syrup with warm water. Sprinkle with yeast, cover bowl, and set aside for 10 minutes until yeast blooms. Stir in olive oil, molasses, and hazelnuts, then slowly add flour and salt, using a wooden spoon at first then switching to your hands. Knead dough for 10 minutes until smooth ball forms, flouring your hands lightly if necessary. Lightly coat ball in olive oil and place in a clean bowl. Cover with a clean dish towel and let rise in a warm, draft-free spot for 2 hours, until dough doubles in size.

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).


Gently punch down dough and separate into 2 halves. Knead each ball a few times and form into loaves, cover with a cloth, and let rise for 1 hour. Bake each half in 9 x 5-in (2-L) loaf pan or on a lightly floured cookie sheet for 25-30 minutes.

#### • MAKES ABOUT 50CRISPS.

#### 1 recipe Dark Hazelnut Rye Bread (opposite)

#### Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Slice baked, cooled loaf in half lengthwise, then into slices, as thin as you can make them, about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. On an unoiled cookie sheet, bake for 5 minutes, turn slices over, then bake for another 5 minutes, until crisp.



### **SOURDOUGH STARTER**

A starter can potentially keep forever if you take care of it; some bakeries have starters that are 100 years old. The older the starter gets, the more complex its flavors will be and the better it will taste. The grapes add a different kind fermentation to the mix, adding greater complexity of flavor.

### SOURDOUGH BREAD

Sourdough is one of the oldest ways of making bread. A sourdough made in one location will taste differently from one made elsewhere. It's easy to double this recipe if you have enough starter. I usually slice one of them and keep it in the freezer so I always have bread for toast.

#### <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) organic grapes (optional) <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) organic whole wheat four (rye and whole spelt fours also work) 1 cup (250 mL) water (room temperature, fltered)

Wrap grapes in cheesecloth to make a pouch, then crush grapes inside pouch.

In a 4-cup (1-L) glass jar or bowl, mix flour and water. Place crushed grapes (still inside cheesecloth pouch) in mixture. Keep in warm dark place. After 12 hours, discard ¼ cup (60 mL) of starter and add 2 tbsp new flour and 3 tbsp fresh water. Repeat every 12 hours for the first 48 hours.

On the third day, discard grapes. Starter is now ready to use. It should smell sweetly sour. If it smells "off" at any point, discard it and start again.

After using some of the starter to make Sourdough Bread (opposite), feed it with 2 tbsp flour and 3 tbsp fresh water. Store in a jar with a lid in refrigerator. Add 2 tbsp flour and 3 tbsp fresh water every 2 weeks to keep it fresh. To use after it's been refrigerated, add 3 tbsp flour and 2 tbsp water, and let sit, uncovered, for 12 hours or overnight in warm dark place.

#### • MAKES 1 LOAF.

1 cup (250mL) warmwater <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125mL) sourdough starter (opposite) 1<sup>1</sup>/2 tsp salt 2-3 cups (500-750mL) four; wheat mixed with 1 part whole wheat, spelt or rye 1 tsp dive oil 1 thsp commeal

In a glass or ceramic bowl, mix water, starter, and salt. Slowly add flour, using a spoon at first then switching to your hands. Knead dough for 10 minutes until smooth ball forms. Dough should feel smooth and elastic and "alive," as gluten strands form, making dough stretchy. Lightly coat ball in olive oil and place in a clean glass or ceramic bowl. Cover with clean dish towel and keep in a warm, draft-free area for 12 hours, or overnight.

After 12 hours, dough should double in size. If not, let it rise for up to another 4 hours, if needed. Turn out dough onto lightly floured surface. Knead a few times and form into a loaf. Roll in flour. Place loaves on a baking pan sprinkled with cornmeal and cover with a clean dish towel. Let rise for 6 hours.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

With a sharp knife, make 2 slashes on top of loaf. Spray loaves with salted water (using a spray bottle) to keep crust from getting too hard during baking. Bake for 35 minutes, until bread is golden.

### SWEET COCONUT Bread

### SESAME FLAX CRACKERS

This bread pairs well with warmly spiced soups and curries, but is also a treat when eaten with just a little jam.

Top these crackers with Brazil Nut Sea Pâté (p. 31) or Cashew Cheese (p. 192) and a slice of tomato for a delicious raw snack.

#### • MAKES 1 LOAF.

1 cup (250 mL) f aked unsweetened coconut, toasted 2 cups (500 mL) white spelt f our 1 tsp baking soda 1/2 tsp salt 1/4 cup (60 mL) agave nectar or 8 Medjool dates, blended until smooth 1/4 cup (60 mL) coconut oil, melted 2 cups (500 mL) nice milk 1 tsp lime juice Smoke Cured Coconut (p. 210) (optional, to gamish)

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, whisk together dry ingredients. In a separate bowl, whisk together wet ingredients. Add wet ingredients to dry and combine with a wooden spoon until just mixed.

Add batter to a lightly oiled bread pan or preheated 8-in (20-cm) cast-iron pan. Sprinkle top of loaf with coconut flakes. Bake for 30–40 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.


Cool for at least 10 minutes before inverting out of pan.

#### • MAKES ABOUT 16 LARGE CRACKERS.

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>cup (125 mL) ground brownf ax seeds 3tbsp black sesame seeds <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>cup (185 mL) water 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp tamari <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp sesame cil

In a bowl, combine all ingredients. Let sit for 3 hours or overnight.

On Silpat (non-stick) dehydrator trays, spread mixture <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. Dehydrate at 115°F (46°C) degrees for 15 hours, until crispy and dry. Break apart and store in a sealed container.



### **PIEROGI DOUGH**

Use this with Miso Eggplant Pierogies (p. 112) or fill them with other savory fillings, or even fresh fruit and spices.

#### MAKES 55 60 PIEROGIES.

#### 3-4 aps (750 mL-1 L) white spet f our 1 tsp salt 1¼ aps (310 mL) water ap (80 mL) grapessed or dive oil

In a large bowl, mix flour and salt. Stir in water and oil until a sticky dough forms. Cover bowl and let rest for 30 minutes. Generously flour a clean work surface. Turn out dough and knead for 2 minutes, adding more flour if necessary.


Using <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) dough at a time, roll out with a floured rolling pin until <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-in (3-mm) thick. Use a pierogi maker or 3-in (8-cm) round cutter to cut circles. Place 2 tsp filling in center, then fold dough circle in half. Smooth out any air bubbles, then pinch edges to seal. If dough is too dry, dampen edges with a little water. Place pierogies on a floured baking sheet. (At this point, you can freeze pierogies on the tray and transfer to freezer bag or container once frozen.) You can leave them at room temperature or in refrigerator for 1 hour before cooking.

To cook fresh pierogies, bring a large pot of water to boil on high heat. Reduce heat to medium-high and drop pierogies in, being careful not to crowd pot. Let cook for 3 minutes, and remove with a strainer or sieve.

To cook frozen pierogies, remove from freezer when heating water and let sit for at least 5 minutes before cooking. Boil for 5 minutes. Strain.

To pan-fry fresh pierogies, heat 1 tbsp grapeseed oil in a frying pan on medium heat. Add pierogies, flat side down, and cover pan. Cook for 1–2 minutes and turn when golden. Cook for another 1–2 minutes, until golden.


To pan-fry frozen pierogies, remove from freezer 5–10 minutes before cooking. Let each side cook for 3 minutes, reducing heat if they start to brown too quickly.

### DARK CHOCOLATE CAKE WITH CHOCOLATE GANACHE GLAZE ಟಿ Avocado Mint ice cream

This rich chocolate cake, with more chocolate on top, will pair beautifully with any ice cream, but I recommend creamy and refreshing Avocado Mint.

#### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

#### DARK CHOCOLATE CAKE

1 ½ cups (375 mL) four ¼ cup (60 mL) accoapowder ¼ cup (60 mL) brown sugar 2 tsp baking soda ½ tsp salt 1 cup (250 mL) water cup soy yogurt or milk (or nut or rice milk) 2 tbsp or angejuice 1 tbsp molasses ¼ cup (60 mL) maple syrup ¼ cup (60 mL) molesyrup cup (80 mL) oil 1 tsp varilla extract 2 oz (60 g) dark chocolate, melted

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, combine dry ingredients and make a well in center. In a separate bowl, combine wet ingredients. Add wet ingredients to dry and stir until just mixed. Pour into a lightly oiled or non-stick 9-in (23-cm) cake pan and bake for 35–40 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Let cool for 10 minutes and turn out onto a cooling rack.

#### CHOCOLATE GANACHE GLAZE

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>cup (185 mL) cocorut cream (you can refrigerate a can of cocorut milk and use only the cream that separates to the top)
2 thsp cocorut oil
1 cup (250 mL) chocolate chips or shavings
2 thsp brown rice syrup
2 thsp maple syrup
1 tsp varilla extract
2 thsp cocoa powder

In a pot on medium heat, add coconut milk, oil, and chocolate chips, stirring constantly until melted. Add syrups, vanilla extract and cocoa powder. Spoon or pour over the cooled cake, and refrigerate, or let sit until the glaze hardens. Alternatively, you can serve the cake as is, and spoon warm glaze on top just before serving.

Makes enough for 1 10-in (25-cm) cake.

#### TO PLATE:

Avocado Mint Ice Cream (p. 165) Portion a slice of cake on a small plate. Top with 1 scoop ice cream.

### WHITE CHOCOLATE CASHEW MOUSSE WITH DATE CARAMEL පි CARDAMOM

Vegan white chocolate, you say? This dessert is rich and full of cocoa butter flavor, and the sweetness of the mousse and caramel are a perfect match with the bitter cacao nibs and spicy cardamom.

#### MAKES 6SERVINGS.

#### WHITE CHOCOLATE CASHEW MOUSSE

cup (80 mL) coconut oil 1.4 oz (40 g) cocoa butter 2 cups (500 mL) rawcashews, soaked in 2 cups water overnight and drained 1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk ½ cup (125 mL) maple syrup 3 thsp coconut or nice four 1 vanillabean, scraped ½ tsp salt

In a double boiler on medium heat, melt coconut oil and cocoa butter and set aside. In a blender or food processor, purée cashews with coconut milk until smooth. Add maple syrup, flour, vanilla bean, and salt and blend until smooth. Slowly pour in cocoa butter and oil while blender is running and blend until smooth. Pour into a shallow pan, cover and refrigerate overnight.

#### **DATE CARAMEL**

6dates, f nely chopped <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) brown nice syrup <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (mL) maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp salt In a pot on medium heat, combine all ingredients and bring to a boil. Do not stir. Let boil for 2 minutes, then remove from heat. Let cool to room temperature.

Makes ½ cup (125 mL).

#### TO PLATE:

2 tsp cacao nibs ½ tsp cardamom seeds

With a mortar and pestle, grind cacao and cardamom. Sprinkle <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp across a plate. Scoop a serving of mousse on each plate and top with 2 tsp Date Caramel.

### GRAHAM SHORTCAKES WITH FRESH BERRIES, HAZELNUT ICE CREAM & VANILLA CASHEW CREAM

A light summer dessert, slightly sweet.

#### • MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

#### VANILLA CASHEW CREAM

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (185 mL) cashevs, soaked in 1 cup vater ovenright and drained
1 14 cz (398 mL) can coconut milk cup (80 mL) maple symp or agave cup (80 mL) coconut cil
1 vanilla bean, scraped, or 1 tsp vanilla extract

In a blender, purée cashews with coconut milk and maple syrup on high until smooth and creamy. In a double boiler on medium heat, melt coconut oil. While blender is running, slowly add melted coconut oil and blend until incorporated and smooth. Stir in vanilla. Chill for at least 4 hours or overnight.

Makes 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups (625 mL).

#### **GRAHAM SHORTCAKES**

1 ap (250 mL) white wheat ar spelt four 1 ap (250 mL) graham four 1 the plaking powder <sup>3</sup>/4 tep salt <sup>1</sup>/2 ap (125 mL) cocarut al, room temperature <sup>1</sup>/4 ap (60 mL) light brown sugar 1 ap (250 mL) nut ar nice milk coarse salt, to gamish sugar, to gamish Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a food possessor, pulse flour, baking powder, salt, coconut oil, and sugar until crumbly and combined well. Transfer to a bowl and slowly add milk, stirring with a wooden spoon until a smooth dough forms, then use your hands, as needed. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and, using a lightly floured rolling pin, roll out to <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-in (2-cm) thick. Stamp out biscuits with a 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-in (4-cm) cutter, brush with a little milk, and sprinkle with coarse salt and sugar. Bake for 15–20 minutes, or until golden.

Makes 10-12 shortcakes.

#### TO PLATE:

3 cups (750 mL) fresh seasonal berries Hazelnut Ice Cream (p. 163)

Slice shortcakes in half. Place bottom half on plate and top with berries and dollop of Vanilla Cashew Cream. Top with other half of shortcake.

### FIG MAPLE PECAN PIE WITH COCONUT LEMON ICE CREAM

Serve this pie slightly warm and gooey and enjoy its toasty pecan flavor.

#### • MAKES 8 10SERVINGS.

#### FIG MAPLE PECAN PIE

2 cups (500 mL) coarsely chopped fresh black f gs 1 cup (250 mL) coarsely chopped pecans cup (80 mL) soy or almond milk 1/4 cup (60 mL) coconut oil juice of 1 lime cup (80 mL) maple syrup 1 thsp blackstrap molasses 3 thsp f our (for gluten-free coconut or nice f our), mixed with 1/4 tsp baking sock and 1/2 tsp baking powder 1 tsp cocca powder 1/2 tsp ground cimamon zest of 1 lime, f nely grated 1/2 tsp salt

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> batch Shortcrust Pastry (p. 155), unbaked, set in a 10in (25-cm) pie plate

Preheat oven to 425°F (220°C).

In a food processor, pulse figs and pecans until a small ball forms.

In a saucepan on low, heat milk and coconut oil until oil melts. Remove from heat and whisk in lime juice. Stir in maple syrup and molasses. Stir pecan mixture into milk mixture until well-combined.

In a separate bowl, combine dry ingredients. Fold into wet ingredients. Pour into uncooked pastry shell and bake for 15 minutes, then reduce oven temperature to  $350^{\circ}$ F (180°C) and bake for another 35–45 minutes, until set.

#### **TO PLATE:**

Coconut Lemon Ice Cream (p. 166)

Serve a slice of warm pie with a scoop of ice cream on the side.

### CHOCOLATE HAZELNUT PIE WITH BALSAMIC CHOCOLATE SAUCE & LAVENDER VANILLA ICE CREAM

This recipe works best if you have a Vitamix blender to make the filling as smooth as possible, but you can also get good results with a food processor.

#### • MAKES 8 12 SERVINGS.

#### CHOCOLATE HAZELNUT PIE

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60mL) coconut oil
6 oz (175g) chopped chocolate
<sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125mL) rawcashews in <sup>1</sup>/2 cup water ovenight and chained
<sup>3</sup>/4 cup hazehnuts, to sted then soaked in <sup>3</sup>/4 cup water ovenight and chained
10 oz (300g) medium f rmtofu cup (80mL) maple syrup
10 Medjool dates, pitted
1 tsp vanilla extract
<sup>1</sup>/2 tsp ground cinnamon
<sup>1</sup>/2 tsp salt

#### 1 recipeNutCrust (p. 156); usehazelnuts and cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a double boiler on medium heat, melt coconut oil and chocolate, then set aside. In a Vitamix or food processor, blend remainder of filling ingredients until smooth. While blender is running, slowly pour in melted oil and chocolate and blend until smooth. Pour into a 10-in (25-cm) springform pan with pre-baked Nut Crust and bake for 25 minutes. Chill overnight.

#### **BALSAMIC CHOCOLATE SAUCE**

1 cup (250mL) balsanic vinegar <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60mL) maple syrup cup (80mL) chopped dark chocolate (70 percent or higher caco)

In a pot on medium heat, bring balsamic vinegar and maple syrup to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes, or until reduced by half. Remove from heat and whisk in chocolate until melted.

Makes <sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (160 mL).

#### TO PLATE:

2 tbsp chopped hazelnuts Lavender Vanilla Ice Cream (p. 165)

Place 2 tsp Balsamic Chocolate Sauce on plate. Place slice of pie on sauce and top with scoop of Lavender Ice Cream. Garnish with chopped hazelnuts.

## DESSERT:

### PUMPKIN MOUSSE PIE WITH CARAMEL ಆ CARDAMOM Almond ICE CREAM

Maybe I use pumpkin too much. Is it possible to use something that good too much? You tell me after trying this smooth and creamy take on the classic pumpkin pie; it's a bit like a cheesecake.



#### • MAKES 8 12 SERVINGS.

2 cups (500 mL) rawcashews, soaked in 4 cups water overnight and drained 1 cup (250 mL) baked, mashed sweet potatoes\* (baked whole, wrapped in foil at 400°F [200°C] for 45 minutes or until soft) 1 cup (250 mL) pumpkin purée 1/4 cup (60 mL) molasses <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) maple syrup 1 tsp vanilla extract 2 tbsp almond butter 2tbspcccnut four 1 tsp ground cinnamon <sup>3</sup>/4tspground ginger <sup>1</sup>/4tspground allspice <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>tspground nutmeg tsp ground doves <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tspsalt cup (80mL) coconut ail, melted <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> batch Shortcrust Pastry (p. 155), pre-baked in a 10 in (25 cm) springformpan or pieplate or Cocorut RiceCrust (p. 156)

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a food processor or blender, blend cashews, sweet potatoes, pumpkin, molasses, maple syrup, vanilla, butter, flour, spices, and salt until smooth. While blender is running, slowly add melted coconut oil. Pour into a 12-in (30-cm) springform pan with pre-baked crust and bake for 25 minutes.

\*I use Hannah white sweet potatoes for a good texture, but Jewel or Garnet yams are also great.

#### CARAMEL

cup (80mL) coconut oil ½cup (125mL) coconut oream 1 cup (250mL) packed brown sugar ¼cup (60mL) brown rice syrup ½tsp salt 1 tsp varilla extract


In a pot on medium heat, bring all ingredients except vanilla to a boil, stirring only at the beginning to combine. Boil for 3 minutes without stirring or until temperature reaches 230°F (110°C) and remove from heat. Whisk in vanilla and let cool at room temperature.

Makes 1 cup.

#### TO PLATE:

Cardamom Almond Ice Cream (p. 167)

Spoon 2 tsp caramel in middle of a plate. Place a slice of pie on one side of Caramel and a scoop of ice cream on the other.



### ANCHO CHOCOLATE TRUFFLE PIE WITH SEA SALT & BUTTERNUT SQUASH WALNUT ICE CREAM

This rich and velvety pie has just a slight hint of spice.

#### • MAKES 8 12 SERVINGS.

cup (80mL) coconut oil 4oz (115g) chopped chocolate 1 cup (250mL) rawcashews soaked in 2 cups water overnight and drained 1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk cup (160mL) cocca powder 34 cup (185 mL) maple syrup 3 thsp coconut f our 1 tsp vanilla extract 14 tsp ground cinnamon tsp ground cinnamon tsp ground dowes 14-1/2 tsp ancho or cayerine pepper; to taste 1/2 tsp salt 1 recipe Nut Crust (p. 156); use chocolate and walnuts

In a double boiler on medium heat, melt coconut oil and chocolate, and set aside. In a food processor or blender, blend remainder of filling ingredients until smooth. While blender is running, slowly pour in melted oilchocolate mixture and blend until smooth. Pour into 10-in (25-cm) springform pan with pre-baked Nut Crust and chill overnight.

#### TO PLATE:

1 tsp ground cinnamon Butternut Squash & Walnut Ice Cream (p. 166) 1 tsp flaked sea salt

Sprinkle a tiny pinch of cinnamon in a diagonal line across a square plate. Place a slice of pie in the middle and a scoop of ice cream beside it. Sprinkle a pinch of salt on top of pie before serving.

# CARROT CAKE WITH CARAMELIZED FIGS, PISTACHIO ICE CREAM & CACAO NIBS

This dessert is full of natural sweetness from the dates and figs and features gentle autumn flavors.



#### • MAKES 8 SERVINGS.

### **CARROT CAKE**

1 cups (315 mL) spelt four <sup>3</sup>/4tsp baking soda 1 tsp baking powder 1 tspground cinnamon 1 tsp ground ginger <sup>1</sup>/4tsp ground nutmeg tsp ground doves tsp ground allspice 2tspccccapowder <sup>1</sup>∕₂tspsalt 1 cup (250 mL) almond or rice milk 1 tsp apple cider vinegar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>cup(125mL) maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/4 ap (60 mL) al <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp vanilla extract 5 Medjool dates, pitted and chopped cup(160mL) grated canots

In a pot on medium heat, bring all ingredients except vanilla to a boil, stirring only to combine. Boil for 3 minutes or until temperature reaches  $230^{\circ}$ F (110°C), and remove from heat. Whisk in vanilla. Let cool at room temperature.

### TO PLATE:

Pistachio Ice Cream (p. 162) 1 tbsp cacao nibs

Place a slice of carrot cake onto each plate. Pour Fig Caramel over cake and top with a spoonful of Pistachio Ice Cream. Sprinkle a few cacao nibs around each plate.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, combine dry ingredients and make a well in the center. In a separate bowl, combine wet ingredients. Add dates and carrots. Add wet ingredients to dry, stirring until just mixed. Pour into a 9-in (25-cm) cake pan and bake for 20–25 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean.

### FIG CARAMEL

# **COCONUT PINEAPPLE CREAM PIE**

This flavorful and refreshing pie makes for a show-stopping dessert. Make this the day before you plan to serve it, because it needs an entire night to set properly.

### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

214 oz (398 mL) canscoconut milk, chilled (use only creamthat has separated out at top) 2 bananas (not over-nipe) cup (80mL) agavenedar 1 lime, juiced and zested <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) coconut ail, melted 1 cup (250 mL) pure pineapple juice cup (80mL) lemonjuice 3tbspmplesyrup <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) agave nectar cup (80mL) brown rice syrup zest of 2 lemons, grated findy 3tbsp arrowroot powder 1 tbsp agar agar powder <sup>1</sup>/2 recipe Shortcrust Pastry (p. 155), pre-baked in 10 in (25 cm) springformpan or pieplate a 1 recipeCoconut RiceCrust (p. 156)

In a blender or food processor, blend coconut cream, bananas, agave nectar, and lime juice and zest until smooth. While blender is running, slowly pour in coconut oil until emulsified. Pour into a bowl and refrigerate.

In a separate bowl, whisk together pineapple and lemon juice, maple syrup, agave nectar, brown rice syrup, lemon zest, and arrowroot powder. Pour into saucepan and sprinkle agar agar over top. Let sit for 2 minutes. On medium-low heat, bring pineapple mixture to a slight boil, stirring lightly but constantly. When little bubbles begin to form, remove from heat and promptly pour into cooled crust.

Chill pie for 2–3 hours in refrigerator. Spoon coconut filling into pie only after pineapple filling has set and coconut filling is firm enough to hold its shape. Chill overnight before serving.

**TO PLATE:** Serve all by itself.

# **CASHEW LEMON PUDDING CAKE**

This is probably the best cake in the whole world, so moist and flavorful (or so I've been told by the many people I've served it to at VSS). I like to serve it warm with a little Ginger-Infused Maple Syrup.

### • MAKES 8 12 SERVINGS.

ap (80mL) coconut milk 1 cup (250 mL) rawcashews, soaked in 2 cup water overnight and drained juice of 1 lemon (about <sup>1</sup>/4 cup [60 mL]) <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) agave nectar 1/4 cup (60 mL) grapeseed oil 2tbspfour <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp baking soda 1 ap (250 mL) maple syrup zest of 1 lemon juice of 1 lemon (about 1/4 cup [60 mL]) 1 cups (315mL) coconut milk cup (160 mL) grapeseed oil <sup>1</sup>/2tsp vanilla extract 2<sup>1</sup>/2 cups (625 mL) four 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp baking soda  $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a blender or food processor, blend coconut milk with cashews, lemon juice, agave nectar, and oil. Pour into a bowl and gently whisk in flour, baking powder, and baking soda until just mixed. Set aside.

In a separate bowl, combine maple syrup, lemon zest, lemon juice, coconut milk, oil, and vanilla.

In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder and soda, and salt. Add maple syrup mixture and stir until just mixed. Pour into a 12-in (30-cm) springform pan. Gently pour blended cashew mixture onto cake in one layer. Fold batters together for a subtle marbled effect.

Bake for 45–60 minutes, until cashew mixture is set (cake should spring back if touched very lightly with a fingertip).

### TO PLATE:

Place a slice of warm cake on each plate. Serve with Ginger-Infused Maple Syrup (p. 202).



# PEANUT BUTTER, WHITE CHOCOLATE ප BROWNIE CHEESECAKE

Everything that's decadent and delicious has gone into this one: white chocolate and peanut butter cheesecake marbled with dark chocolate brownie batter. (Note: If you've invited dinner guests, make sure they don't have peanut allergies!)

#### MAKES 8 12 SERVINGS.

1.4 oz (40g) cocca butter ap (80 mL) coconut ail 1 cup (250 mL) rawcashews, soaked in 2 cups water overnight and drained cup (160mL) coconut milk <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) peanut butter 1 tsp vanilla extract 1/2 tsp salt cup(160mL) white spelt four aup (80mL) sugar <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) cocca powder 1/2 tsp baking soda 1/2 tsp baking powder <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) white chocolate, chopped  $\frac{1}{2}$  ap (125 mL) soymilk 2tbspbrownricesyrup 2 the grapeseed oil 1 the papele sauce <sup>1</sup>/2tsp apple cider vinegar

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a double boiler, melt cocoa butter and coconut oil and set aside.

In a blender or food processor, blend cashews, coconut milk, maple syrup, peanut butter, vanilla extract, and ½ tsp salt. While blender is running, slowly pour in melted coconut oil and cocoa butter and process until smooth.

In a separate bowl, combine flour, sugar, cocoa powder, baking soda and powder, and ½ tsp salt. Make a well in the center.

In a double boiler, melt chocolate. Whisk in 1 tbsp of soy milk at a time to temper chocolate. Whisk in brown rice syrup, oil, apple sauce, and cider vinegar.

Gently stir the chocolate mixture into dry ingredients, but do not over-mix. Alternating chocolate batter and peanut butter white chocolate batter, spoon into a lightly oiled 10-in (25-cm) springform pan. Use a knife to marble cake. Bake for 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted into the brownie part of the cake comes out clean.

**TO PLATE:** Serve this all by itself.

### **PUMPKIN MAPLE CINNAMON BUNS**

Less sweet than regular cinnamon buns, but just as gooey and irresistible.

#### • MAKES 10 12 BUNS.

1 cup (250 mL) warmwater or milk (nut, rice, etc.) 1 thep molasses 3/4tsp yeast cup (80mL) puréed pumpkin 1/2 tsp salt 2 thsp grapeseed oil 1 tspground cinnamon 1 tsp ground ginger <sup>1</sup>/4tsp ground nutmeg tsp ground doves 3 cups (750 mL) spelt four; plus 3/4 cup (185 mL) for kneading 1 tsp grapeseed oil 8 Medjool dates <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) brown sugar 2tspground cinnamon cup (80mL) softened coconut oil or softened Earth Balance vegan margarine cup (80mL) chopped pecans (optional)

In a bowl, add water or milk and molasses and stir to combine. Sprinkle yeast on top, cover bowl, and set aside for 5–10 minutes, until yeast has bloomed.

Stir in pumpkin, salt, 2 tbsp oil, and ground spices. Slowly add flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup (125 mL) at a time, until a workable dough forms. Switching to your hands, turn out

dough onto a lightly floured surface. Knead dough for 5–10 minutes, until a smooth ball forms. In a clean bowl, lightly coat dough with 1 tsp oil. Cover bowl with a tea towel and set aside in a warm, draft-free spot and let rise for 2 hours, until doubled in size.


Meanwhile, in a blender or food processor, blend dates with maple syrup, sugar, cinnamon, and coconut oil or vegan margarine. Set aside.

When dough has risen, turn out onto a lightly floured surface. Pull or roll out into a  $\frac{1}{2}$ -in (1-cm) thick rectangle. Spread  $\frac{2}{3}$  of date filling over dough, then sprinkle with pecans. Roll up into a cylinder and cut into 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ -in (4-cm) slices. In a lightly oiled 10 x 12-in (25 x 30-cm) glass baking pan, place buns, spaced evenly. Top with the remaining date mixture. Cover and let rise for 35 minutes.

Preheat oven to 325°F (160°C). Bake for 20–25 minutes, until toothpick inserted into center of a bun comes out clean. Serve warm.

### TO PLATE:

Serve with Vanilla Cashew Cream (p. 135) and Spiced Maple Syrup (p. 202).



# SWEET POTATO LIME CRÈME BRÛLÉE

This is probably the most sought-after recipe from VSS; I almost hesitated to put it in this book! But here it is, with its sweet potato secret revealed. Make this the day before you plan to serve; it needs to chill overnight.



### • MAKES 6 8 SERVINGS.

# 2-3small white f eshed Harmah sweet potatoes (enough to yield 2 cups/500 mL when cooked and mashed) 1 13 oz (370 g) can coconut milk 2 thsp lime juice 1 tsp lime zest 1 vanillabean, scraped, or 1 tsp vanilla extract 3 thsp maple syrup ¼ cup (60 mL) can esugar; for sprinkling

Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).

Bake whole sweet potatoes on a baking sheet, wrapped in foil, for 45 minutes–1 hour, or until soft. Let cool and then peel. Add 2 cups (250 mL) sweet potatoes to a blender or food processor. Add coconut milk, lime juice and zest, vanilla, and maple syrup and blend until smooth. Chill for 6 hours, or overnight.

Spoon into crème brûlée cups. Sprinkle a layer of sugar a scant ¼-in (3-mm) thick over crème. Using a food torch, caramelize sugar so a smooth hard crust forms.

# **SALTED RYE SABLÉS**

The texture of these is very much like shortbread and the taste is perfect for a refined sweet tooth, with just a hint of sweetness. Topped with sesame seeds, these sablés are a perfect mate for Cashew Cheese (p. 192).



### • MAKES ABOUT 24 COOKIES.

1 ¼ cups (310 mL) ryef cur 4 thsp anowroot powder ½ tsp salt ½ cup (125 mL) softened coconut oil 4 thsp maple syrup or agave nectar ½ tsp lemon juice ¼ tsp sea salt, for sprinkling

In a bowl, combine flour, arrowroot powder, and salt. Using a pastry cutter or fork, cut in softened coconut oil. Switch to your hands and completely blend oil and flour, until a crumbly dough forms. Add maple syrup and lemon juice and combine well.

Turn dough out onto a large piece of plastic wrap and form into a 2-in (5-cm) thick log. Wrap dough in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 20 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

Unwrap dough and, with a sharp knife, slice into ¼-in (6-mm) thick slices. Place on an un-oiled cookie sheet, 1 in (2.5 cm) apart. Lightly sprinkle tops of cookies with sea salt. Bake for 12–15 minutes. Transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely.

# **TOASTED NUT SABLÉS**

I like to use pecans or pistachios in these cookies, which are a slightly different take on Rye Sablés (p. 153), and a tiny bit sweeter.

# CANDIED GINGER DATE COOKIES

These are chewy rather than crispy ginger cookies, and extra spicy.

### MAKES ABOUT 30 COOKIES.

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>cup (185 mL) rice four 1 cup (250 mL) rye four 4 thsp anowoot powder <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp salt cup (160 mL) softened coconut oil <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) chopped nuts (pecars or pistachios) 5 thsp maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp lemonjuice

In a bowl, combine rice and rye flour, arrowroot powder, and salt. Using a pastry cutter or fork, cut in softened coconut oil. Switch to your hands and completely blend oil and flour, until a crumbly dough forms. Add nuts, maple syrup, and lemon juice and combine well.

Turn dough out onto a large piece of plastic wrap and form into a 2-in (5-cm)-thick log. Wrap dough with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 20 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

Unwrap dough and, with a sharp knife, slice into ¼-in (6-mm) thick slices. Place on an unoiled cookie sheet ¼-in (6-mm) apart. Bake for 12–15 minutes. Transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely.

### • MAKES ABOUT 24 COOKIES.

1½ cups (375 mL) spelt f our ½ tsp baking powder ½ tsp baking soch ½ tsp salt 1 tsp ground ginger ½ tsp ground nutmeg ¼ tsp ground doves ¼ cup (60 mL) molasses ¼ cup (60 mL) brown nice syrup ½ cup (125 mL) surf over oil 1 tsp apple oider vinegar 1 tsp varilla extract 8 Medjool dates, pitted and chopped ¼ cup (60 mL) chopped candied ginger

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, combine dry ingredients. In a separate bowl, combine wet ingredients with dates and candied ginger. Pour the wet ingredients into dry and gently combine until well-mixed.

Take 2 tsp dough and form into a ball. Place on an un-oiled cookie sheet, 2-in (5-cm) apart. Repeat with remaining dough. Gently press a fork onto cookies to flatten slightly. Bake for 12–15 minutes, until edges are slightly golden. Transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely.

# SHORTCRUST PASTRY

# **COCONUT PASTRY**

This versatile pastry freezes well; just wrap the dough in a couple layers of plastic wrap. To defrost, leave in refrigerator overnight.

A beautiful pastry, a little less fatty than the Shortcrust (opposite), and made solely with coconut oil. It can be used in place of Shortcrust in any recipe.

### • MAKES ENOUGH FOR 2 10 IN 25 CM COVERED PIES OR 4 SHELLS.

3cups (750mL) white spet four ½ tsp salt ¾ cup (185mL) vegetable shortening ¼ cup (60mL) Earth Balance vegan margarine ½ cup (125mL) cold water

In a large bowl, sift flour and salt. With a pastry cutter or fork, cut in shortening and margarine until well combined. The mixture should be crumbly. Pour in cold water and stir to combine, using your hands at the end. Knead a few times until it forms a smooth dough. Make sure not to over-knead.

Generously flour a clean work surface. Portion dough into 4 parts. Form a ball with 1 part and gently flatten. Flour top of ball and turn it over a few times, flattening with your hand. Make sure it won't stick to work surface. Lightly flour a rolling pin and roll out dough to about ¼-in (6-mm) thickness. Fold in half, then lift and set onto pie plate. Unfold and press gently into place.

To blind bake crust, line with parchment paper, then pour in enough dried beans to cover bottom and bake at  $350^{\circ}$ F ( $180^{\circ}$ C) for 10-12 minutes. Beans can be re-used.

### • MAKES 1 10 IN 25 CM COVERED PIE OR 2 SHELLS.

2 cups (500 nL) white spelt f our <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 nL) softened coconut oil 1 tsp apple cider vinegar cup (80 nL) cold water

In a large bowl, mix flour and salt. With a fork or pastry cutter, cut in coconut oil until well incorporated. Add vinegar and water and gently combine with a fork just until a dough forms. Use your hands, if needed.

Generously flour a clean work surface. Portion dough into 4 parts. Form a ball with 1 part and gently flatten. Flour top of ball and flip it over a few times, flattening with your hand. Make sure it won't stick to work surface. Lightly flour a rolling pin and roll out dough to about ¼-in (6-mm) thickness. Fold in half, then lift and set onto pie plate. Unfold and press gently into place.

To blind bake crust, line with parchment paper, then pour in enough dried beans to cover bottom and bake at  $350^{\circ}F(180^{\circ}C)$  for 10–12 minutes. Beans can be re-used.

# **NUT CRUST**

This is another no-fail, all-purpose crust. You can mix and match flavors to go with what you have on hand or the type of pie you're making—almond cinnamon crust, hazelnut mocha crust, or chocolate walnut crust are good choices.

# **COCONUT RICE CRUST**

This crust has a shortbread taste and is a great gluten-free option that goes with almost any pie filling.

### • MAKES 1 10 IN 25 CM CRUST.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, combine nuts with dry ingredients and make a well. In a separate bowl, combine wet ingredients. Add wet ingredients to dry and stir until combined. Use your hands, as needed, at the end to combine ingredients. Press into a pie plate or 10-in (25-cm) springform pan. 1 ap (250mL) f nely shredded unsweetened coconut ½ ap (125mL) nice f aur 2 thsp comstarch ½ tsp salt 2 thsp brown nice syrup 2 thsp grapeseed oil

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, combine dry ingredients and make a well. Add syrup and oil and stir until combined. Use your hands, as needed, at the end to combine ingredients. Press into a pie plate or 10-in (25-cm) springform pan. Bake for 10 minutes, until lightly golden.

# **CHOCOLATE OAT CRUST**

### This simple crust goes great with most fillings.

### • MAKES 1 10 IN 25 CM CRUST.

# <sup>3</sup>/4 cup (185 mL) rolled cats 1 cup (250 mL) spelt f cur (for gluten fire: 1 cup rice f cur plus 1 thsp anowroot powder or constarch) 2 thsp cocca powder <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp salt 3 thsp grapesed cil 3 thsp brown rice syrup or agave nectar

In a bowl, combine dry ingredients and make a well. Add oil and brown rice syrup and stir until combined. Use your hands, as needed, at the end to combine ingredients. Press into a pie plate or 10-in (25-cm) springform pan.

### **PEANUT OAT CRUST**

Peanuts are always a good fit for chocolate. I don't use peanut butter in any VSS cooking due to potential allergy issues, but I do enjoy this myself. (You can also substitute another nut butter, such as almond, cashew, etc.)

### • MAKES 1 10 IN 25 CM CRUST.

1 cup (250mL) cat f cur (process 1¼ cups [310mL] rolled cats in a food processor) ½ cup (125mL) rolled cats 3 thsp pearut butter (or other nut butter) 2 thsp maple syrup 2 thsp cil

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

Combine flour and oats and make a well. In a separate bowl, combine nut butter, maple syrup, and oil. Add wet ingredients to dry and stir until combined. Use your hands, as needed, at the end to combine ingredients. Press into a pie plate or 10-in springform pan.

### ICE CREAM

If you have an ice cream maker, you can freeze the following ice cream recipes according to the manufacturer's directions. Even if you don't own one, you can still make perfect ice cream. Here is my method:

Take two metal bowls that nest together well. Fill one up with water and place the other one on top. (You may want to do this in the sink, as adjusting the water levels can be messy.) Weigh the top bowl down with a bag of frozen peas, until the bowls are nesting with an even layer of water between them. Place the stacked bowls in the freezer for two hours, until water is frozen solid.

Remove bag of peas. Pour the well-chilled ingredients into your frozen bowl and stir it. It will start freezing to the bowl as you scrape the sides. Stir for at least five minutes before taking a break. You can put the bowl back in the freezer for about ten minutes to harden the ice cream slightly and keep the bowl frozen, then remove it and stir again, until ice cream reaches the desired consistency. Transfer ice cream to a sealed container and keep in the freezer for up to two weeks.

The base in most of these recipes is coconut milk. You can substitute other milks, but coconut milk will result in a smoother and creamier ice cream, especially when turning by hand, because of its higher fat content.

# DARK CHOCOLATE Almond ice cream

# PISTACHIO ICE CREAM

You can make this without the chopped almonds, but their crunch complements the creamy, rich ice cream.

Creamy and rich with a toasty pistachio flavor, a little like kulfi, a dense type of ice cream from India.

• MAKES 3 CUPS 750 ML.

### • MAKES 2 CUPS 500ML.

½cup (125mL) almonds, soaked in ½cup water overnight and drained
1 cup (250mL) coccrut milk cup (80mL) maple syrup
3 the space appowder
½ tsp almond extract (optional)
1 the spinelted coccrut oil
¼ cup (60mL) chopped dark chocolate, melted
1 vanillabean, scraped, or 1 tsp vanilla extract
¼ cup (60mL) finely chopped almonds (optional)

In a blender or food processor, purée all ingredients, except final ¼ cup chopped almonds, until smooth. Stir in chopped almonds. Chill in a covered bowl or container in refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161.

# **HAZELNUT ICE CREAM**

There is an amazing organic hazelnut farm in rural Agassiz, BC, where I get all my hazelnuts. Then I have to stop myself from putting hazelnuts in everything I make! Except this wonderful ice cream.

• MAKES 2 CUPS 550ML.

1 14 oz (398 mL can coconut milk ¼ cup (60 mL) agavesyrup ¼ cup (60 mL) maple syrup tsp grangum 1 vanillabean, scraped, or 1½ tsp vanilla extract ¼ cup (60 mL) toasted and skinned hazehruts, soaked in 1 cup water overnight and drained 3 thsp chopped toasted hazehruts

In a pot on medium heat, bring coconut milk, agave syrup, and maple syrup to just under a boil. Whisk in guar gum and stir until mixture starts to thicken. Let cool. Stir in vanilla.

In a blender or food processor, purée soaked hazelnuts with coconut milk mixture. Stir in chopped hazelnuts. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161.

# LAVENDER VANILLA ICE CREAM

Avocado lends a smooth, creamy texture and a beautiful color to this unusual ice cream.

The lavender flavor in this ice cream is subtle, with a hint of white chocolate.

• MAKES 21/2 CUPS 625 ML .

1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk ¼ cup (60 mL) agave syrup ¼ cup (60 mL) brown rice syrup 1 thsplimejuice 1 avocado 1 cup (250 mL) fresh mint leaves

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients until smooth. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator for at least 4 hours or overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161. • MAKES 21/2 CUPS 625 ML .

1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk ¼ cup (60 mL) agave syrup ¼ cup (60 mL) brown nice syrup 1 thsp dried lavender f overs ¾ oz (25 g) cocca butter tsp grangum 1 varilla bean, scaped or 1½ tsp varilla extract

In a pot on medium heat, bring coconut milk, agave syrup, brown rice syrup, and lavender to almost a boil. Add cocoa butter and guar gum, whisking until butter melts. Remove from heat. Let cool for 5 minutes. In a blender, purée until smooth. Stir in vanilla and chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161.

# COCONUT LEMON ICE CREAM

# BUTTERNUT SQUASH පි WALNUT ICE CREAM

Not as tart as a sorbet, this ice cream still delivers a clean palate-cleansing flavor.

Warmly flavored, a little like a pumpkin pie: this is real comfort-food ice cream.

• MAKES 2 CUPS 630ML.

1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk ¼ oup (60 mL) sugar ¼ oup (60 mL) brown nice syrup tsp guar gum 2 lemons, juiced and zested ¼ oup (60 mL) grated coconut (optional)

In a pot on medium heat, bring coconut milk, sugar, and brown rice syrup almost to a boil. Whisk in guar gum. Remove from heat, and stir in lemon zest, juice, and coconut. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161. • MAKES 3 CUPS 750ML.

1 cup (250 mL) peeled and cubed butternut squash ¼ cup (60 mL) toasted walnuts 1 14 oz (398 mL) can coconut milk ½ cup (125 mL) maple syrup ½ tsp varilla extract ¼ tsp ground cinnamon tsp ground nutmeg

In a pot, place a 6-in (15-cm) vegetable steamer. Add at least 1-in (2.5-cm) water, place squash in steamer, and cover pot. Steam squash on medium-high heat for 10 minutes, until squash is tender. Set aside to cool.

In a blender or food processor, blend squash with remainder of ingredients until smooth. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161.

# CARDAMOM ALMOND ICE CREAM

# BALSAMIC MARBLED COCONUT ICE CREAM

This is ice cream all grown up; earthy, bold, and light.

This ice cream is great with Dark Chocolate Cake (p. 133) or Chocolate Hazelnut Pie (p. 139).

### • MAKES 2 CUPS 500 ML.

½cup (125mL) blanched almonds, scaked in 1 cup water for 6 hours and drained
1 cup (250mL) coconut milk
¼cup (60mL) maple syrup
2 thsp brown rice syrup
1 thsp olive oil
1 tsp varilla extract
¼ tsp almond extract
1 tsp orange zest
½ tsp orushed cardamomseeds tsp salt
1 thsp f nely chopped chocolate (optional)

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients until smooth. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161. • MAKES 21/2 CUPS 625 ML .

1 14-oz (398 mL) can cocorut milk ¼-oup (60 mL) agave syrup ¼-oup (60 mL) brown rice syrup ¼-tsp guar gum 1 varillabean, scraped, or 1 ½ tsp varilla extract 2 thsp Balsanic Reduction (p. 205)

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients, except Balsamic Reduction, until smooth. Chill in a covered bowl or container in the refrigerator overnight before following manufacturer's instructions for ice cream maker, or those provided on p. 161.

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

# CRÊPES

Classic crêpes are simple to make and great to eat with just a sprinkle of brown sugar and a squeeze of lemon. You can make them the day or night before and heat them back up in the pan; they will taste just as fresh.

### • MAKES ABOUT 6 CRÊPES.

### 1 cup (250 mL) spelt or wheat four 1 cup (250 mL) milk of your choice (nut, nice, etc.) ½ tsp salt grapeseed or coconut oil or Earth Balance vegan marganine, for cocking crêpes

In a bowl or mixer, whisk or mix flour, milk, and salt. While blender is running or while continuing to beat batter, slowly add water, a little at a time, to make a smooth, thin batter. It should be thin enough to coat the back of a spoon but still drip off easily.

In a small, wide-bottomed, non-stick frying pan or griddle on medium, heat a scant tsp oil. Pour about  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup (80 mL) batter into middle of pan and lift and tilt pan so that crêpe thins and spreads to cover bottom of pan.

Cook until edges of crêpe begin to set, about 1 minute. Turn crêpe and cook other side for about 1 minute, until light golden brown. Stack crêpes on a plate and keep them warm in oven at minimum temperature with a damp cloth over them.

# SWEET POTATO FRITTERS WITH COCONUT SOUR CREAM, APPLE TAMARIND CHUTNEY, ROASTED PINEAPPLE & SMOKE-CURED COCONUT

This is the first VSS brunch I ever served, and it's still one of my favorites. Leftover fritters (if there are any!) are great refried for a sandwich the next day.



### • MAKES 6 8SERVINGS.

### SWEET POTATO FRITTERS

8 cups (21.) grated sweet potatoes (or a mix of potatoes, yams, and sweet potatoes)
2 garlic doves, minced
1 cup (250 mL) nice four
2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp cayerne pepper tsp garammasala (p. 210)
1/4 cup (60 mL) soy milk
1 tsp applecider vinegar
2 tbsp grapesed cil
1/4 cup (60 mL) chopped fresh cilantro cup (80 mL) chopped green onions
grapesed cil, for frying

In a large bowl, mix all ingredients with a wooden spoon until well incorporated. Use your hands, if needed, to combine ingredients.

Preheat and generously oil a frying pan or griddle on medium. Use ¼ cup (60 mL) batter to form patties or fritters about ½-in (1-cm) thick. Fry on each side for 5 minutes. Serve immediately.

Makes about 18 fritters.

### **ROASTED PINEAPPLE**

1 whole pincapple, chopped into chunks 1 thsp coconut oil, melted ½-½ tsp red pepper f akes, to taste 1 tsp tamari 1 thsp limejuice

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a bowl, toss pineapple with coconut oil, red pepper flakes, tamari, and lime juice. On an unoiled cookie sheet, roast pineapple for 15 minutes, turn chunks over then roast for another 15 minutes.

### TO PLATE:

Apple Tamarind Chutney (p. 196) Smoke-Cured Coconut (p. 210) Coconut Sour Cream (p. 195) fresh cilantro, chopped, for garnish

In middle of a plate, spread 3 tbsp chutney. Place 1 fritter on each side of chutney. Top with pineapple chunks and a sprinkle of Smoke-Cured Coconut. Spoon 1 tbsp Coconut Sour Cream on side. Garnish with 1 tsp fresh cilantro.

# PEANUT BUTTER OAT WAFFLES WITH WHITE CHOCOLATE MOUSSE & VANILLA PLUM COMPOTE

An ob-so-fancy take on a peanut butter and jelly sandwich that makes one sweet, sweet breakfast!

### • MAKES 8 10WAFFLES.

WHITE CHOCOLATE MOUSSE

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) cocorut cil <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) chopped cocca butter 1 cup (250 mL) cocorut milk <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) maple syrup 1 varilla bean, scraped

In a heat-proof bowl on boiling water or in a double boiler, melt coconut oil and cocoa butter. In a blender or food processor, combine coconut milk, maple syrup, and vanilla bean. While blender is running, slowly pour melted coconut oil and cocoa butter into blender and blend until well-incorporated and smooth. Pour into a bowl or container, cover, and chill overnight in refrigerator.

Makes 21/2 cups (625 mL).

### VANILLA PLUM COMPOTE

1½ cups (375 mL) pitted and quartered purple Italian plums ½ vanilla bean (a shelled bean works great) ¼ cup (60 mL) brown rice syrup 2-3 thsp dark brown sugar

In a pot on medium heat, combine all ingredients and bring to a simmer, stirring constantly. When plums begin to soften and cook down, adjust brown sugar, to taste. Let simmer for 10 minutes, until thick. Set aside to cool. (Keeps for 3–4 weeks in refrigerator.)

Makes 1 cup (250 mL).

### **PEANUT BUTTER OAT WAFFLES**

1½ cups (375 mL) four cup (160 mL) whole cats 1 thsp cocca powder (optional) ½ tsp baking powder ½ tsp baking soda ¼ tsp salt 1½ cups (375 mL) milk of your choice (nut, nice, etc.) ½ cup (125 mL) natural pearut butter 3 thsp maple syrup 3 thsp oil 1 tsp apple cider vinegar 1 tsp varilla extract

In a bowl, mix together dry ingredients and make a well. In a separate bowl, whisk together wet ingredients. Make sure peanut butter is well-incorporated. Pour wet ingredients into dry and combine gently until just mixed.

Preheat waffle iron or waffle maker and follow manufacturer's instructions. Oil iron lightly.

### TO PLATE:

Place 1 or 2 waffles on a plate and top with Vanilla Plum Compote and White Chocolate Mousse.

# **PUMPKIN WAFFLES**

The first waffle brunch VSS served was on a snowy morning in Vancouver, which is really rare and special. On that memorable morning, these waffles were paired with Vanilla Cashew Cream (p. 135) and Ginger-Infused Maple Syrup (p. 202).

### • MAKES 10 12WAFFLES.

1 the ground faxseeds 3 the protection of the second seco

In a bowl, whisk together ground flax seeds and water and set aside.

In a separate bowl, combine dry ingredients and make a well. In another bowl, whisk milk, purée, maple syrup, oil, and vinegar. Add flax-water mix to wet ingredients. Pour wet ingredients into dry and combine gently until just mixed.

Preheat waffle iron or waffle maker and follow manufacturer's instructions. Oil iron lightly.

# DOUBLE CHOCOLATE WAFFLES WITH MOCHA CREAM

I like to serve these waffles with Raspberry Maple Syrup and fresh berries.

### • MAKES 8 10WAFFLES.

### MOCHA CREAM

1 ap (250 nL) coconut aream ¼ ap (60 nL) coconut ail ¼ ap (60 nL) brown rice symp 1 thsp maple symp 1 thsp instant cof ee 2 thsp cocca powder 1 tsp vanilla extract

In a pot on medium heat, whisk all ingredients together until coffee dissolves and oil melts. In a blender or food processor, purée until smooth. Pour into bowl or container, cover, and chill overnight in refrigerator.

Makes 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups (375 mL).

### **DOUBLE CHOCOLATE WAFFLES**

2 cups (500 mL) four <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) cocca powder 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp baking soda <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp salt tsp ground doves 2 cups milk of your choice (nut, nice, etc.) 3 thsp grapesed oil 3 thsp maple syrup 1 tsp applecider vinegar 1 tsp vanilla extract

### 1 barana, mashed 8 Medjool dates, chopped cup (160 mL) chocolate chips or chopped chocolate

In a bowl, mix dry ingredients together and make a well. In a separate bowl, whisk together wet ingredients, then stir in mashed banana and dates. Add chocolate chips. Pour wet ingredients into dry and combine gently until just mixed.

Preheat waffle iron or waffle maker and follow manufacturer's instructions. Oil iron lightly.

### TO PLATE:

Raspberry Maple Syrup (p. 203)

Top each waffle with Mocha Cream, a drizzle of Raspberry Maple Syrup, and fresh berries.

# TOASTED COCONUT GREEN TEA

Rooibos is my favorite herbal tea. It is low in tannins, so it doesn't become bitter, and is full of antioxidants.

This tea has an amazing toasted flavor.

#### • MAKES $2\frac{1}{2}$ CUPS 625 ML.

1 the sp whole cloves 1 tep whole black peppercomes 1 star anise 1 tep whole cardamompods <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) crushed cinnamon sticks cup (80 mL) chied chopped ginger 2 cups (500 mL) breved rocibos tea 1 tep allspice

In a food processor, or with a mortar and pestle, grind cloves, peppercorns, star anise, and cardamom. In a bowl, combine ground spices with crushed cinnamon sticks, ginger, brewed tea, and allspice. Store in a sealed jar in refrigerator. Use 2 tsp of tea for each cup (250 mL) water or milk of your choice. Steep for as long as desired.

#### • MAKES ABOUT 3/4CUP 185 ML.

#### <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup (125 mL) Senchagreen tea cup (80 mL) toasted unsweetened coconut

Combine tea and coconut and store in a sealed jar. Use 1 tsp for each cup (250 mL) hot water. Steep for 2–5 minutes.

## **GINGER BEER SYRUP**

Reminiscent of Earl Grey.

Extra spicy.

### • MAKES CUP 160 ML.

### <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) loose black tea 2 thsp dried lavender f owers 2 tsp chopped dried orange peel

Combine all ingredients and store in a sealed jar. Use 1 tsp for each cup (250 mL) hot water. Steep for 2–4 minutes.

### • MAKES 1 CUPS 630ML.

### 1 cup (250mL) thinly sliced ginger 1 cup (250mL) water ¾ cup (185mL) maple syrup or agave nectar ¼ cup (60mL) lime juice

In a pot on medium-high heat, combine all ingredients except lime juice. Bring to a boil and simmer for 25 minutes. Let syrup sit overnight before straining. Add lime juice. To make Ginger Beer, use up to 2 tbsp concentrate per 8 oz (230 g) sparkling water.

# LAVENDER LIME SODA Concentrate

# ROOT BEER CHICORY Soda concentrate

Refreshing, with a subtle hint of lavender.

An herbal root beer.

#### • MAKES 11/2 CUPS 625 ML .

### <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>cup (185 mL) agavenedar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>cup (125 mL) limejuice 2 thsp dried lavender forwars

In a pot on medium-high heat, bring agave nectar and lime juice to a boil. Boil for 6 minutes. Remove from heat. Add lavender and let steep for 20 minutes. Strain. To make soda, use 1 tbsp concentrate per 8 oz (230 g) sparkling water.

### • MAKES 21/2 CUPS 625 ML CONCENTRATE.

 ½cup (125 mL) maple syrup

 ½cup (125 mL) agave nectar

 1½cups (375 mL) water

 1 the thinly sliced fresh ginger

 1 vanillabean, scraped

 1 cinnamon stick

 1 star anise

 1 tep licorice root (licorice tea bag works well)

 3 the proasted chicory root

In a pot on medium-high heat, combine all ingredients except for chicory. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer for 15 minutes. Add chicory and simmer for another 10 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool before straining. To make soda, use 2 tbsp concentrate per 8 oz (230 g) sparkling water.

## **ROASTED GARLIC**

Roasted garlic is used a lot in this book. Here's how I do it.

### 1 wholegarlic bulb 1-3 tbsp oliveoil

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C).

Cut top off garlic bulb so that cloves are exposed. Place bulb in aluminum foil and form foil into a small bowl.

Pour in olive oil and wrap foil into a sealed packet. Set packet in a small oven-proof bowl and bake for 25 minutes, or until garlic is soft and fragrant.

# SMOKY BALSAMIC MARINADE FOR PORTOBELLO MUSHROOMS

## MISO SESAME Shiitake Mushrooms

These flavorful mushrooms are a great addition to most salads or for simply tossing with soba noodles.

A great marinade for roasted, dehydrated, or pan-fried mushrooms.

#### • MAKES ENOUGH FOR 4 8PORTOBELLOS.

In a bowl, whisk all ingredients together, except mushrooms. Add sliced or whole portobellos. Cover and let marinate for 30 minutes–2 hours in refrigerator. You can also marinate mushrooms a in a resealable plastic bag. 1 tsp toasted sesame seeds 1 tsp vater 1 tsp toasted sesame oil 1 tsp toasted sesame oil 1 tsp olive oil 1 tsp brown nice vinegar ½ tsp Dijon must and 1 tsp miso ½ tsp tamari ¼ tsp liquid smoke (optional) tsp cayenne pepper 4-10 shiitake mushrooms, depending on size, sliced

In a bowl, whisk all ingredients except shiitakes together. Add shiitakes, cover, and let sit for 30 minutes–2 hours in refrigerator. You can also put mushrooms and marinade in a resealable plastic bag to marinate.

If you have a dehydrator, place shiitakes on screen and dehydrate for about 1 hour, checking often, until mushrooms have softened.

Or, preheat oven to 350°F (180°C). Place mushrooms on lightly oiled baking pan and roast for 5–7 minutes, turn over, and roast for another 5–7 minutes.

Or, pan-fry shiitakes in a non-stick or lightly oiled pan on medium-high heat for 2–3 minutes on each side.

# **REJUVELAC NUT CHEESE**

Fermented nut cheeses are popular not only for their health benefits (they're a great source of vitamin B12) but also their amazingly complex, cheesy flavor. Although fermentation takes time, it also adds beneficial probiotics to the cheese.



#### • MAKES 11/2CUPS 375ML.

### cup (80mL) organic wheat benies 8 cups (2L) f ltered distilled water 1 cup (250mL) rawnuts (cashews, pinenuts, or macadamianuts)

In a 4-cup (1-L) glass jar, soak wheat berries for 12 hours in 1 cup (250 mL) water.

Using a strainer, strain berries and return to jar. Cover top of jar with a clean dish towel or paper towel and seal with rubber band. Leave in a warm, sunny spot for 36 hours. Rinse berries with 1 cup filtered water every 12 hours.

After 36 hours, or when berries begin to sprout slight-

ly, rinse them a final time and fill jar with 3 cups (750 mL) filtered water. Place fresh dish towel or new paper towel over jar and set in a warm, dark spot. Check every 12 hours for signs of fermentation: the rejuvelac should appear slightly cloudy and bubbly and should have a fermented "cheesy" fragrance. This will take about 2 days. If mixture start to smell vinegary or sour, throw it out.

When rejuvelac is ready, strain out berries and reserve liquid. Pour it back into jar and seal with a lid. Rejuvelac will keep in refrigerator for up to 1 week.

To ferment nuts, bring rejuvelac to room temperature, add nuts, cover top of jar with paper towel, and let sit in a warm, dark place for 12 hours. Strain rejuvelac and reserve liquid. Use nuts as suggested in Cashew Cheese (p. 192).

## **CASHEW CHEESE**

Cashews are my favorite nut to use when making fermented cheese, both for their fat content and subtle flavor, but macadamia nuts, walnuts, hazelnuts, and almonds also make tasty cheeses.

# COCONUT CASHEW CHEESE

This is a less spreadable cheese with a more saucy consistency than Cashew Cheese. Its gentle flavor reminds me a little of cottage cheese. It goes nicely with Yam & Walnut Croquettes (p. 91) or Crêpes (p. 171) paired with your favorite fruit preserves.

#### • MAKES 1 ½ CUPS 375 ML.

1 cup (250 mL) rawcashews, soaked in 1 cup rejuvelac (p. 191) for 12 hours, strained, soaking liquid reserved 1 thsp lemon juice ½-1 tsp sea salt

In a blender or food processor, blend cashews with lemon juice, salt, and just enough soaking liquid to facilitate blending, up to  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup (80 mL). Blend until smooth. Store in a sealed container in refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

### **HERBED CHEESE VARIATION:**

1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper 1/4 tsp red pepper f akes 1/2 tsp each fresh chopped herbs of your choice (e.g., rosemary and sage, thyme and lavender, or basil)

Stir herbs into blended cheese.

### • MAKES 2 CUPS 500ML .

 1 cup (250 mL) rawcashevs, soaked in 1 cup rejuvelac for 12 hours, strained, soaking liquid reserved
 1 the terminative for terminative for the terminative for t

In a blender or food processor, purée cashews with lemon juice, salt, apple cider vinegar, coconut milk, and rejuvelac until smooth. Store in a sealed container in refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

# **PINE NUT PARMESAN**

Crumble this vegan cheese over salads, popcorn, and pasta. Or omit the dehydrating step and add it to pesto.



#### • MAKES ABOUT 1 CUP 250ML.

### 1 cup (250mL) rawpinenuts, soaked in 1 cup rejuvelac for 12 hours, strained, soaking liquid reserved 1 tbsplemon juice 1¼ tsp sea salt

In a blender or food processor, blend pine nuts with lemon juice, salt, and just enough soaking liquid to facilitate blending, up to  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup (80 mL). Blend until smooth.

On a Silpat (non-stick) dehydrator tray, spread mixture in a thin layer ¼-in (3-mm) thick. Dehydrate at 115°F (46°C) for 4 hours, or until cheese is crisp and crumbles nicely. Store in a sealed container at room temperature.

## MISO CASHEW Cheese

# COCONUT MELTING CHEESE

This nut cheese is made by soaking the nuts overnight, which is less time-consuming than the method using rejuvelac. The texture is the same as the fermented cheese (p. 192). A perfect cheese sauce for broiling on toast, nachos, and pizza.

### • MAKES 1½ CUPS 375 ML.

1 the unpasteurized miso 2 cups (500 mL) water 1 cup (250 mL) rawcashews 1 the lemonjuice 2 tep tahini 1 the prutritional yeast 1 tep applecider vinegar ½-1 tep salt, to taste

In a bowl, whisk miso into water. Add cashews and soak for 12 hours. Drain cashews, reserving <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup (80 mL) soaking liquid. In a blender or food processor, add cashews and remainder of ingredients and blend until smooth. Adjust salt to taste. Store in a sealed container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. • MAKES 3/4 CUP 185 ML.

6roasted garlic doves (p. 189), skins removed 1 tsp tahini ½cup (125 mL) soy or almond milk 2 thsp coconut oil, melted 1 thsp nutritional yeast 1 tsp tomato paste ½ tsp Dijon mustard 2 tsp f ne com f our 2 tsp lemon juice 1 tsp salt

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients until smooth.

# COCONUT SOUR CREAM

A great-tasting cheese to sprinkle over pizza, pasta, salads, and soups.

This is the recipe I use the most—it goes with anything!

#### • MAKES 2 CUPS 500ML.

• MAKES ½ CUP 125 ML .

2 garlic doves cup (80mL) walnuts 2 thsp sesame seeds cup (80mL) nutritional yeast ½ tsp salt ¼ tsp red pepper f akes

In a blender or food processor, pulse all ingredients until crumbly and evenly blended. Store in a sealed container in the refrigerator. 1 13 oz (370 g) can coconut cream 1 tbsp lemon juice 1 tsp apple cider vinegar 1 tbsp tahini ½ tsp salt 1½ tsp brown rice syrup ¼ cup (60 mL) plain non-dairy yogurt (optional)

In a blender or food processor, blend all ingredients until smooth. Refrigerate overnight to thicken.

## CARROT TAMARIND CHUTNEY

## APPLE TAMARIND CHUTNEY

This spicy chutney is nicely complemented by the sweetness of the carrots.

This chutney is tangy and sweet and pairs well with Sweet Potato Fritters (p. 172).

• MAKES 2 CUPS 500ML.

1 thspref ned coconut oil 1 mediumonion, chopped ½tsp salt 3 gadic dowes, smashed ½habañero pepper, seeded and chopped, or 1 thsp habañero or Scotch bonnet hot sauce 2 mediumcanots, chopped 3 thsp tamarind paste/concentrate 1 thsp agavenectar ¾cup (185 mL) stock (p. 45)

In a medium pot on medium heat, melt coconut oil. Add onions and salt and cook until onions are translucent. Add garlic, habañero peppers, and carrots and cook for another 2 minutes, until carrots are softened. Add tamarind, agave, and stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for another 10 minutes. Remove from heat.

In a food processor or blender, blend all ingredients until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids. Store in a well-sealed glass container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. • MAKES 4 CUPS 1L.

8oz (230g) whole tamaind or ½oup (125 mL) tamaind paste/concentrate 1 tsp grapesed oil ½oup (125 mL) chopped shallots or red onions 2 apples, cored and chopped (Granny Smith is best) 1 tsp red pepper f akes ½ tsp cumin 1 th sp tamari ½oup (125 mL) maple syrup 2 cups (500 mL) water

If using whole tamarind, which comes in a condensed brick, soak in ½ cup (125 mL) boiling water for 10 minutes and strain out seeds before adding to recipe.

In a medium pot on medium-high, heat oil. Add shallots and sauté until translucent. Add apples, red pepper flakes, and cumin and cook for another 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add tamarind, tamari, maple syrup, and water and let simmer for 15 minutes. Remove from heat.

In a blender or food processor, or with an immersion blender, blend chutney until smooth. Be careful when blending hot liquids.

Pour into jars while hot and process in a water bath if you are planning to store the chutney long-term. Unprocessed, it will keep in a well-sealed glass container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

## FRESH PEACH Chutney

# APPLE CHIPOTLE LIME CHUTNEY

Every August I go up to the Okanagan valley, the fruitgrowing region in the Interior of British Columbia, and bring back fresh, ripe peaches. This chutney is a little spicy, and is great with roasted cauliflower or Baked Eggplant Samosas (p. 27).

#### Spicy, sweet, and smoky, this chutney pairs well with fresh corn on the cob, fritters, and cornbread. For chipotle peppers I usually take a whole can in adobo sauce, blend it in the food processor, and keep it in the refrigerator for up to 4 weeks.

#### • MAKES 6 CUPS 1.5 ML.

2 thsp coconut oil
1 mediumshallot, f nely chopped
2-4 fresh T ai chili peppers (depending on howspicy you like it), f nely chopped
1 thsp grated fresh ginger tsp garammasala (p. 210)
2 lbs (1 kg) peaches (approximately 10), peeled and cubed
1 tsp tamari
¼ cup (60 mL) lime juice
-½ cup (80 - 125 mL) vinegar cup (80 mL) brown rice syrup (to taste) cup (80 mL) chopped fresh cilantro

In a large pot on medium-high heat, melt coconut oil. Add shallots, chilies, ginger, and garam masala and sauté until shallots are translucent. Add peaches, tamari, lime juice, vinegar, and brown rice syrup. Simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in cilantro just before removing from heat.

Pour into jars while hot and process in a water bath if you are planning to store the chutney long-term. If not processing, store in a sealed glass container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.


### • MAKES 2 CUPS 500ML.

2 apples, peeled and f nely chopped 3 thsp unsweetened apple sauce 1 thsp blended chipotle peppers, in adobo sauce 1 lime, juiced and zested 1 ½ tsp lime juice ¼ cup (60 mL) agave nectar ¾ cup (185 mL) water ¼ cup (60 mL) water ¼ cup (60 mL) water 1 tsp comstarch

In a pot on medium heat, combine all ingredients except <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (60 mL) water and cornstarch. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat, and simmer on low.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk cornstarch into ¼ cup water. Whisk into chutney once it simmers, and cook for 10 minutes. Remove from heat.

Pour into jars while hot and process in a water bath if you are planning to store the chutney long-term. If not processing, will keep in a sealed glass container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.



## **QUICK PICKLED BEETS**

These are easy to make and keep for a long time.

#### • MAKES 1 QT/L.

**3**largebeets 1 tbsp dive ail  $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt 1 small shallot, sliced 1 cup (250 mL) water <sup>1</sup>/2 cup (125 mL) white vinegar <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) apple cider vinegar cup (80mL) canesugar 2tsp.salt 2 tsp coniander seeds 1 tsp whole peppercoms 1 tsp red pepper f akes 2 whole dowes 1 bayleaf 1 tsp mustard seeds 1/4 tspaminseeds

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

Wash and trim beets. Rub with olive oil. Place them in aluminum foil, sprinkle with salt, and wrap tightly. I usually put about 2–3 beets in each foil packet. Bake beets for 45 minutes, or until they are cooked through. Let beets cool, then peel them, which is quite easy to do with your fingers.

Cube or slice beets to desired size (or quarter, if beets are small). Place beets and shallots in a 4-cup (1-L) Mason jar, or split between 2 pint jars.

In a saucepan, heat remainder of ingredients until sugar dissolves and mixture boils. Pour over beets, covering them completely with pickling liquid. Tightly seal jar with lid and tip on its side to cool. This will produce a light seal. Let sit at room temperature until cool and refrigerate for 12–24 hours before eating.

## QUICK PICKLED SPICY STRING BEANS

## BALSAMIC MAPLE PECANS

Spicy beans are a great accompaniment to curries.

Spicy, sour, and sweet, this recipe also works well with almonds.

### • MAKES 1 12 OZ 350ML JAR.

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) vinegar cup (160 mL) vater 3 tsp coarse salt 1 thsp can esugar 2 garlic doves, smashed 4 thin slices fresh ginger <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp red pepper f akes, or 1 T ai drili 1 tsp coniander seeds 1 tsp unitard seeds 1 tsp whole ferugreek <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp cumin seeds 1 tsp whole ferugreek <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp cumin seeds 1 tsp whole peppercorns about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lb whole string beans, ends trimmed, enough to f ll a 12-oz (350 mL) Mason jar

In a saucepan on medium-high heat, bring all ingredients except beans to a boil until sugar and salt are dissolved.

Put beans in a Mason jar. Pour in hot pickling liquid, covering beans. Let cool. Keep in refrigerator. These pickles are best eaten a day or 2 after they are made, but they'll last about 2 weeks. • MAKES 1 1/4 CUPS 310ML.

1¼ cups (310mL) rawpecans ½ tsp balsamic vinegar ½ tsp maple syrup tsp cayenne pepper tsp salt tsp ground black pepper

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C).

Toast pecans on an unoiled baking sheet for 2 minutes, stir and turn over, then continue to bake for another 2–3 minutes.

In a bowl, mix remainder of ingredients. Toss hot pecans, right out of oven, quickly in mixture, to coat evenly. Pour coated pecans back onto baking sheet and bake for another 3–5 minutes, checking to make sure they don't burn. When pecans are caramelized and no longer sticky, turn off oven. Open oven door slightly and let nuts cool completely in oven before removing.

## SALTED MAPLE PISTACHIOS

## ANISE-TOASTED SUNFLOWER SEEDS

Slightly sweet, slightly salty, and wholly irresistible.

Perfect to sprinkle over curries, rice dishes, or salads.

### • MAKES 11/4 CUPS 310ML.

### 1 ¼ cups (310 mL) rawpistachios 1 tsp maple syrup ½ tsp salt

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 350°F (180°C).

Toast pistachios on an unoiled baking sheet for 2 minutes, stir and turn over, then continue to bake for 2-3 minutes.

In a bowl, mix maple syrup and salt. Toss coated pistachios, right out of the oven, quickly in the mixture, to coat evenly. Pour pistachios onto baking sheet and bake for another 3–5 minutes, checking to make sure they don't burn. When pistachios are caramelized and no longer sticky, turn off oven. Open oven door slightly and let nuts cool completely in oven before removing. • MAKES 1/4 CUP 60ML .

#### <sup>1</sup>/2 tsp maple syrup <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp salt <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp crushed anise seeds <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp ground black pepper <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) rawsunf over seeds

Preheat oven or toaster oven to 325°F (160°C).

In a bowl, combine maple syrup, salt, anise seeds, and pepper. On an unoiled baking sheet, spread sunflower seeds and toast for 2 minutes. Remove from oven and pour into bowl with spice mixture. Toss to coat seeds and quickly return them to the baking sheet. Bake for another 1–2 minutes, or until golden. Turn off oven. Open oven door slightly and let nuts cool completely in oven before removing.

## GINGER-INFUSED MAPLE SYRUP

# SPICED MAPLE Syrup

I use this syrup for almost everything I want to sweeten—waffles, crêpes, ice cream, and even tea. A warm and spicy winter syrup.

#### • MAKES 23/4CUPS 650ML.

#### 2 cups (500 mL) maple syrup 1 cup (250 mL) unfiltered applejuice 1 cup (250 mL) sliced firsh ginger

In a large pot on medium-high heat, combine all ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Let syrup sit overnight before straining. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator. • MAKES 23/4CUPS 650ML.

2 cups (500 nL) maple syrup 1 cup (250 nL) unfltered applejuice 1 tbsp black tea (loose or bag) ½ cup (125 nL) sliced fresh ginger 1 tbsp whole black peppercoms 2 cinnamon sticks 1 tsp whole cardamom seeds 1 star anise nind of 1 orange

If tea is loose, place in a tea ball. In a large pot on medium-high heat, combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Once boiling, remove tea bag or ball. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Let syrup sit overnight before straining. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.

## RASPBERRY MAPLE SYRUP

# APPLE REDUCTION

Maple syrup with a subtle raspberry and herbal flavor, this is great drizzled on waffles and over ice cream Intense, condensed apple flavor. This sweet, thick syrup is an amazing alternative to the usual maple for crêpes and waffles.

#### • MAKES 23/4 CUPS 650 ML .


### 2 cups (500 mL) maple syrup 1 cup (250 mL) pure unsweetened raspberry juice 2 raspberry herbal teabags (natural f avoring)

In a large pot on medium-high heat, combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Remove tea bags. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.

#### • MAKES 1 CUP 250ML.

#### 3 cups (750 mL) unfltered applejuice

In a pot on medium-high heat, bring juice to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 40 minutes, until juice has reduced down to 1 cup (250 mL). Syrup should coat the back of a spoon and drip slowly. Remove from heat and cool. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.



## CHIPOTLE APPLE REDUCTION

# BALSAMIC REDUCTION

I use this to finish the Butternut Squash Apple Soup (p. 53). For the chipotle peppers I usually take a whole can in adobo sauce, blend it in the food processor, and keep it in the refrigerator for up to 4 weeks. You can use this whenever you want to add a thick and tangy-sweet kick—with pastas and in salads dressings, and over slices of fresh, juicy garden tomatoes.

#### • MAKES ABOUT CUP SOML.

#### 1 thep blended chipotle peppers in adobo sauce 1 tep ancho chili powder cup (80 mL) Apple Reduction (p. 203)

In a bowl, whisk ingredients until well-blended. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.

#### • MAKES 1/4 CUP 60ML.

#### 1 cup (250 mL) balsamic vinegar

In a small pot on medium-high heat, bring vinegar to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes, until reduced to ¼ cup (60 mL). Syrup should coat the back of a spoon and drip slowly. Remove from heat and cool. This will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.

# ROSEMARY OLIVE OIL

# SMOKE-INFUSED OLIVE OIL

This savory oil adds amazing flavor as a finish to soups, pastas, and roasted vegetables. I use this oil to finish the Fennel Portobello Soup (p. 55), but it will add a slightly smoky, rich finish to any dish.

#### • MAKES CUP SOML.


#### cup (80mL) divecil 3 sprigs fresh rosemary

In a small pot on medium-low heat, combine olive oil and rosemary. Let oil slowly warm for about 10 minutes, until you see bubbles forming on rosemary. Remove from heat and let cool. Remove rosemary sprigs. Pour olive oil into a jar. This will keep in the refrigerator indefinitely.

#### • MAKES 1/4 CUP 60ML .

#### 4 hickary or chenywood chips 1/4 cup (60 mL) dive ail

In a small glass jar, add wood chips. With stove lighter, char half of each chip. Pour olive oil into jar and let sit at room temperature, covered, for 24 hours—the longer the better. This will keep in the refrigerator indefinitely.







## SMOKE-CURED COCONUT

This condiment is amazing in a sandwich, sprinkled on salads, with pierogies, or tossed in trail mix. It also keeps indefinitely, though will benefit from a quick re-toast in the oven if it goes a bit soft. The cooked curing spice is a great condiment as well.

## **GARAM MASALA**

There are many versions of this spice mix; in some regions of India, up to 50 different spices may be used to create the local garam masala. This mixture, when used with ground turmeric and fresh ginger, garlic, onions, vegetables, and either tomato, lime, or lemon, will put any store-bought curry powder to shame.

#### • MAKES ½ CUP 125 ML .

#### • MAKES 4 CUPS 1L.

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) organic canesugar <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) ground smoked salt 2 tsp ground black pepper 1 tsp red pepper f akes 1 tsp smoked paprika (optional) 4 cups (1 L) wideribbon coconut

In a bowl, combine sugar, salt, pepper, chili, and paprika, and add to coconut. Place in a sealed container. Let cure for 2 days, shaking the container occasionally to coat coconut.

After 2 days, preheat oven to 375°F (190°C). Sift coconut flakes using a fine sieve or mesh strainer, saving curing spice. Spread coconut on an unoiled cookie sheet and sprinkle about half leftover spice mix on top. Bake until golden, stirring every 3 minutes. Shake cooked curing spice from coconut. Store coconut flakes in a sealed container. cup (80 mL) currin seeds cup (80 mL) coriander seeds <sup>1</sup>/4 cup (60 mL) whole peppercoms 3 cinnamon sticks, cushed (or 2 thsp ground cinnamon, added after roasting and blending) 2 thsp ferugreek seeds (or 3 tsp ground, added after roasting and blending) 1 thsp whole dows 3 tsp must and seeds 1 thsp cardamon seeds (or 2 tsp ground, added after roasting and blending) 1-2 thsp red pepper f akes 7 bay leaves

In a bowl, combine all ingredients. In a frying pan on medium heat, dry roast spice mix, stirring constantly for 5 minutes, until fragrant. Remove from heat and spread on a plate to let cool.

When spices have cooled completely, grind in a blender or food processor, or coffee grinder used only for grinding spices. Add powdered spices if using. Store in an airtight container for about 3 months, or 6 months in the freezer.

# GOMASHIO

This Japanese condiment traditionally made of crushed, toasted sesame seeds and salt is a great way to add flavor. I add toasted nori to mine and use it mostly in stir fries and noodle soups.



• MAKES ABOUT 1/4 CUP 60ML.

1/4 cup (60 mL) toasted white or black sesame seeds whole or crushed 1/2 tsp sea salt 3 thsp crushed roasted nori (optional)

In a bowl, combine all ingredients. Store in a sealed jar.

VSS PANTRY

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
